## CRICKET EPHEMERA

- 1 Surrey C.C.C. 1875. Rare and very early official fixture card for the 1875 season with home and away fixtures for County matches, Surrey Club and Ground matches, dates of meetings etc. 'By order of the Committee. C.W. Alcock, Secretary. 1st May 1875' to lower border. 3"x4.5". Minor foxing and ageing, otherwise in good/ very good condition £70/100  
*Official County Championship placings were not introduced until 1890. In 1875 Surrey played ten County matches, winning three, losing five and drawing two*
- 2 Surrey C.C.C. 1877. Rare and very early official fixture card for the 1877 season with home and away fixtures for County, representative, Surrey Club and Ground matches, dates of meetings etc. 'By order of the Committee. C.W. Alcock, Secretary. 1st May 1877" to lower border. 3"x4.5". Some foxing and ageing, otherwise in good/ very good condition £70/100  
*Official County Championship placings were not introduced until 1890. In 1877 Surrey played twelve County matches, winning six, losing three and drawing three*
- 3 Surrey C.C.C. 1884. Rare and very early official folding fixture card for the 1884 season with home and away fixtures for County, representative, Test, tour, Surrey Club and Ground matches etc. 'C.W. Alcock, Secretary' to front cover. 3"x4.5". Minor foxing and ageing, otherwise in good/ very good condition £60/90  
*In 1884 Surrey played sixteen County matches, winning seven, losing four and drawing five. The third and final Test match against Australia (the sixth Test match ever to be played, the third in England) was played at The Oval, 11th-13th August. In a high scoring draw Australia scored 551 in their first innings, top scorers were Murdoch (211), McDonnell (103) and Scott (102). Unusually, all eleven England players bowled including the wicket keeper, Lyttleton, who took four wickets for nineteen runs. England's*
- 4 Surrey C.C.C. 1890. Rare and very early official folding fixture card for the 1890 season with home and away fixtures for County, representative, Test, tour, Surrey Club and Ground matches etc. 3"x4.5". VG £40/60  
*When County Championship placings were introduced in 1887 Surrey were Champions from 1887 to 1892, including the 1890 season, the first to be officially organised by the Counties. Surrey played fourteen matches, winning nine, losing three and drawing two. Surrey also played the Australian tourists at The Oval, 22nd-24th May 1890 (Australians won by eight wickets) and 17th-19th July 1890 (match drawn). The Oval also hosted the second Test match against Australia, 11th-12th August 1890, which England won by two wickets*
- 5 Surrey C.C.C. 1891. Rare and very early official folding fixture card for the 1891 season with home and away fixtures for County, representative, Surrey Club and Ground matches etc. 3"x4.5". VG £40/60  
*Surrey were County Champions in 1891, playing sixteen matches of which twelve were won, three lost and two drawn*
- 6 Surrey C.C.C. 1892. Rare and very early official folding fixture card for the 1892 season with home and away fixtures for County, representative, tour, Surrey Club and Ground matches etc. 3"x4.5". Horizontal fold, otherwise in good/ very good condition £40/60  
*Surrey were County Champions in 1892, playing sixteen matches of which thirteen were won, two lost and one drawn*
- 7 Cambridge University C.C. 1911. Original red leather folding Life Member ticket issued to H.W.G. Betteridge. The card with gilt emblem to front and lettering to inside. VG £20/30
- 8 'Bodyline. Season 1932/33'. Original Sydney Cricket Ground ladies membership ticket, with cord attachment, for the 1932/33 season. 'One lady only, once each day from Oct 1st 1932 to Sept 30 1933'. Odd faults, good. Rare £40/60
- 9 Harold Larwood. Nottinghamshire & England 1924-1938. Pair of 'Test Cricket Centenary 1877-1977' blue red and silver commemorative cuff links, by Lega, presented to Larwood when he attended the match and festivities in Melbourne in 1977. In original box with handwritten inscription to inside box lid 'Given to R.P.C. by Harold Larwood 2.8.77'. Sold with Larwood's Honorary Life Membership card for M.C.C. 1968, Larwood's name and address in Sydney, Australia printed to inside. Good condition £60/90  
*The cuff links and membership card were given to the vendors father by Larwood, who was a good friend of the family and often stayed with them*
- 10 Stoics Cricket Club. Early 'List of Matches' folding fixture cards for 1879, 1881, 1886, 1888-1890 and 1894. Also two 'Rules and List of Members' booklets for 1885 and 1888, and a fixture card for two tours, date unknown. Odd faults, otherwise in good condition. Qty 10 £60/90  
*It is believed that the Stoics Cricket Club was founded in 1877, originally for the old boys of Westminster School. Notable players who appeared include A.E. Stoddart, C.J. Kortwright and R.W.V. Robins, but it was while playing for Hampstead against Stoics in a one day match in 1886 that Stoddart scored 485 in a total of 813 for 9, the Stoics not getting a bat*
- 11 Australia. Surrey United Cricket Club, New South Wales. Original printed card with gilt edges announcing the 'Annual Dinner' to be held 7th July 1882. To verso are players batting and bowling averages for the 1881/82 season. Odd minor faults, otherwise in good/ very good condition £50/80

- 12 Lancashire v Surrey 1870. Original copy of the Manchester Evening News for 27th May 1870. The four page issue includes a thirty line report on the first day's play at Old Trafford (Surrey 103, Lancashire 96 for 6). This was the first match of the season and the benefit game for F.R. Reynolds 'who had been the professional bowler of the Manchester club for a period of ten years'. Odd faults and minor loss, otherwise in good condition £50/80
- Frederick Reginald Evans (Lancashire 1865-1874) was manager of Old Trafford cricket ground from 1860 to 1908*
- 13 Wallasey Cricket Club 1925-1960s. A collection of official printed and typed reports, meeting agendas, accounts, averages etc for the period. G £20/30
- 14 New Brighton Cricket Club 1914-1990s. A collection of official printed and typed reports, meeting agendas, accounts, averages etc for the period. G £20/30
- 15 Three original 'Alec Bedser Charts exclusively each week in the Sunday Chronicle', 'Batting Guide', 'Bowling Guide' and 'Fielding Guide' 1954. Each measures 11"x19". The Bowling and Fielding guides in good condition, some wear and tear to the Batting guide £20/30
- 16 American cricket 1970s. Scrapbook comprising newspaper cuttings, the majority copies, of articles relating to American cricket, in particular around New York and Staten Island including items relating to the centenary of State Island Cricket Club in 1972. G £30/50
- 17 Cricket scrapbook 1870s/1890s. Early cricket scrapbook comprising printed cuttings, scorecards, photographs etc with some handwritten annotations and descriptions, collected by William Wright, Manager of the Cricket Press, publishers of pamphlets and brochures on cricket in the latter half of the nineteenth century. The articles relate to the history and development of cricket and includes a trimmed original scorecard for John Lillywhite's Farewell Benefit match, Gentlemen v Players, Brighton 14th-16th August 1871 in which Grace scored 217 for the Gentlemen in their second innings. Also two real photograph bookplates of W.G. Grace and Alfred Shaw, an original member's ticket for a 'Smoking Concert' held at Assembly Rooms, Eyre Arms given by St. John's Wood (Hampstead) Cricket Club, 13th April 1877, a full page handwritten transcription of an article 'copied from the Annual Register of 1827' etc. Some pages loose, generally good condition £80/120
- The following six lots were compiled by George Neville Weston who is renowned as being probably the greatest historian and biographer of W.G. Grace, in particular his attention to the detail of minor matches in which Grace played throughout his career. In the forward to Weston's book 'W.G. Grace The Great Cricketer' published in 1973, Irving Rosenwater quotes A.A. Thompson saying Weston 'knows more about W.G. than any man alive', to which Rosenwater adds, 'or dead'*
- 18 'W.G. The First Fifty Years 1848-1898'. Large green leather album compiled by the cricket writer and biographer, George Neville Weston, comprising photograph cuttings of the Grace family and home at Downend, Bristol, typed scorecards of early matches in which Grace played, a typed list of matches in which Grace played in 1880, a cutting of an article written by W.G. regarding the death in 1880 of his brother, George Frederick, two weeks after the three brothers had represented England against Australia. The album also comprises family history and cuttings relating to cricketers contemporary to Grace. Sold with a further album comprising correspondence relating to Grace from other cricket historians and collectors including Irvine Rosenwater and R.E.D. Rawlins, a mono copy photograph of a miniature of Grace by Louise Townsend which hangs in the City Art Gallery, Bristol. Also postcards of Grace including Rotary Series no. 3801B, the Crystal Palace Cricket Ground, copies of letters written by Grace etc. Odd faults, otherwise in good condition. Qty 2 £100/150
- 19 George Neville Weston. W.G. Grace biographer. Four scrapbooks and two exercise books compiled by Weston. Each scrapbook relates to different aspects of Grace's life and cricketing career. Titles are 'W.G. James Lillywhite's Cricketer's Annual 1886' comprising summaries of Grace's batting and bowling statistics for 1864-1886 in Weston's own hand. 'W.G. Matchbox labels' comprising cuttings, newsletters and correspondence to and from Weston relating to matchbox labels featuring Grace. 'Dr W.G. Grace Depicted on Cigarette Cards. A Guide' comprising handwritten notes relating to specific cigarette cards on which Grace is featured. 'Coloured Caricature of W.G. Grace at "The Cricketers" Kingston-upon-Thames' comprising correspondence relating to a caricature of Grace hanging in 'The Cricketers' pub and Weston's efforts to establish the origin of and to obtain a photograph of the print. The two exercise books are indexes handwritten by Weston relating to articles written about Grace in Wisden etc. Qty 6. G £100/150
- 20 George Neville Weston. W.G. Grace biographer. Five scrapbooks compiled by Weston. Each scrapbook relates to different aspects of Grace's life and cricketing career. Titles are 'From the Thames to the Seine by H. Lawrence Swinburne' comprising cuttings of an article published in 'Black and White' on 31st December 1898 relating to a cross-channel balloon trip seen off from Crystal Palace by Grace. 'The Late Mr Joseph Benjamin Rider ("The last man to have taken W.G.'s wicket (c&b)??) comprising press cuttings relating to the death of Rider in 1963 and related typed correspondence from Weston. 'W.G. Grace and Osbert Sitwell'. Sitwell, poet, playwright and novelist, was down down for M.C.C. membership by Grace at birth, but correspondence including a letter from Diana Rait Kerr, Curator of the Lord's Museum can find no record of Sitwell having been a member. Other contents relate to Sitwell's mother's family, the Londesboroughs, and their connections with cricket at Scarborough. 'Mrs Elizabeth Haley (Grand-daughter of Dr E.M. Grace) also Grace family v Robinson family

- in 1891' comprising typed notes and correspondence relating to this branch of the Grace family. Also notes relating to a cricket match between the Grace and Robinson families played at Ashley Down, Bristol, 20th August 1891. 'Mrs Mabel (Gertrude) Grace', sister-in-law of W.G. with correspondence from The Solicitors' Law Stationery Society and local newspapers relating to Ernest and Mabel Grace including Mabel's original death certificate dated 18th July 1961. G £100/150
- 21 George Neville Weston. W.G. Grace biographer. Six scrapbooks compiled by Weston. Each scrapbook relates to different aspects of Grace's life and cricketing career. Subjects covered include W.G. 'playing for both sides' in a London County v Worcester Park Beagles in 1907, and also his last appearance in a Gentlemen v Players match, played at The Oval, 16th-18th July 1907, in which Grace scored 74 in the Gentlemen's second innings. The album contains typed transcripts of articles and scores and press cuttings relating to the two matches. 'W.G. and Bedfordshire' comprising details of matches played by Grace around 1899 and 1900, Grace's connections with R.S. 'Bob' Sievier, a notable benefactor of Bedfordshire County Cricket Club in their efforts to establish minor county status. 'Merchant Taylors' School' with correspondence relating to matches played by Grace for London County and M.C.C. against the school in 1901, 1910 and 1914. 'W.G. at Buntingford, Herts' comprising correspondence relating to a match W.G. Grace's XI v W.R. Gilbert's XI played at Buntingford on 30th April 1875, also a good selection of original mono postcards of Buntingford village in very good condition. 'Ilmington Stone Carving' comprising two original mono photographs and correspondence relating to a stone carving of a bust of Grace over the gateway of a house in Ilmington, Warwickshire. 'W.G. at Walsall (1874-1875-1883)' comprising typed transcriptions of matches played by Grace at the Cuckery Ground, Walsall, also later correspondence relating to those matches and details of a talk given by Weston to the Rotary Club of Walsall in 1958. G £100/150
- 22 George Neville Weston. W.G. Grace biographer. Five scrapbooks compiled by Weston. Each scrapbook relates to different aspects of Grace's life and cricketing career. Subjects covered include 'W.G. Grace at Home ('Olympia' 1887)' comprising a lengthy typed transcription and cuttings from an article on Grace which appeared in the magazine, 'Olympia, a monthly miscellany of sports and pastimes' in 1887. Also typed statistics of Grace's bowling achievements 1865-1882 and centuries scored 1872-1881. 'W.G. The Scots Observer 1889 and The National Observer 1891' including correspondence from Diana Rait Kerr, Curator of the Lord's Museum, Michael Pugh of M.C.C., and also the British Museum Newspaper Library relating to articles, with typed transcripts and cuttings, that appeared in both publications. 'W.G. in the "Boy's Own Paper"' with cuttings and correspondence with Jack Cox, the author of an article on Grace which appeared in the paper in 1960, and how Grace had introduced his brother-in-law, W.J. Gordon, to the paper as a staff writer. 'England v Australia, Lord's 1884 July 21-23. Sketches from the "Graphic" etc' with typed scores for the second Test played at Lord's and copies of sketches by George H. Cooper, which originally appeared in the 'Graphic' of players who featured in the match, four of which featured Grace. 'W.G. "The Bystander" 1906 July 4 to Sept 12' comprising cuttings from 'The Bystander' which appeared in 1906, in which Grace is strongly featured. G £100/150
- 23 George Neville Weston. W.G. Grace biographer. Five scrapbooks compiled by Weston. Each scrapbook relates to different aspects of Grace's life and cricketing career. Subjects covered include 'W.G. Result of an advertisement in "John O'London's February 25th 1960' comprising a cutting of a classified advertisement placed by Weston asking for 'anything relating to this great cricketer. Resulting correspondence includes six handwritten responses, offering Grace's signature and books for sale etc. 'G.L. Jessop on W.G.' comprising cuttings of Jessop's article on Grace which appeared in the 'M.C.C. Book for the Young Cricketer' published in 1951, also cuttings from Punch, 12th September 1896. 'Lord's 1874' relating to the book, 'Arlott and Trueman on Cricket' published in 1977. Correspondence relates to Weston trying to obtain a copy of a picture of Grace that appeared in the book with letters from the B.B.C. Stephen Gree, Curator of the M.C.C. museum, also the Cooper-Bridgman Library. 'British Broadcasting Museum "Today from the South West"' (Bristol) "Good Morning Wales" (Cardiff) Oct 22nd 1965' comprising correspondence relating to Weston asking for transcripts of interviews relating to Grace, and a script for the piece broadcast on the Welsh home Service in 1965. 'W.G.' 1960 & 1959. Interesting letters and enclosures from my friends...' comprising a good selection of handwritten letters and cuttings. G £100/150
- 24 England tour to Australia 1894/95. 'Sporting Sketches'. Copy of the magazine for 18th March 1895. The front cover has a portrait of 'The Hero of the Hour- J.T. Brown' in batting pose, taken from a Hawkins original. Brown's 140 in England's second innings in the fifth Test in Melbourne (1st-6th March) had secured a win in the five-Test series by three matches to two. Page five comprises an article by W. Brockwell, 'Our Trip to the Antipodes', being an account of the tourists' visit to Broken Hill and Dandenong in January 1895 where matches were played. Lillee, this time, bowled from his full run and in his second over he beat Boycott with a purely straight ball of such high pace that it

howled through an embryo stroke and whipped out the middle stump... Close played such an innings as is rare in over-limit cricket which simultaneously secured the innings and gave it powerful impetus'. Arlott describes the run out of Close and how 'It can be argued the match was decided in that moment'. England's innings closed at 236 for nine. 'Some wayward bowling by Snow and Arnold gave the Australian innings an easy start... Stackpole thumped off the back foot and Ian Chappell struck with compact power... The younger [Greg] Chappell, who learnt much about the over-limit game while he was at Somerset, now paced the innings with sound understanding, playing his strokes with fastidious ease... Watson - with a runner - and Marsh brought the matter to a comfortable end...'. Handwritten alterations and deletions in Arlott's hand. G/VG £80/120

*England went on to win the deciding match at Edgbaston by two wickets to win the three match series 2-1*

- 48 John Arlott. England v New Zealand 1973. Four original typed manuscripts written by Arlott for articles for The Guardian newspaper. The reports covers the second Test, England v New Zealand, Lord's, 21st-26th June 1973, with one article for play on days one (five page report), two, four and five (each four pages). On day one Arlott describes England, having been put in by New Zealand captain, Congdon, playing 'some injudicious strokes but five missed chances - all four main scorers were dropped early in their innings - let them escape to a score which their bowlers might yet make respectable'. The weather is described as 'a steamy atmosphere'. Boycott is described 'hooking Taylor for six, a stroke peremptory as the crack of a ring master's whip'. Later in the day with wickets falling regularly 'the English innings became a salvage operation carried out by Greig with the inordinately long tail as his junior partners'. England finished the first day on 240/9. At the end of the second day's play 'New Zealand are now 53 runs behind England with seven wickets left... [with] New Zealand favourites to win'. The pitch is described as 'firm but true... while

encouraging stroke making... Snow bowled with pace, immaculate control... Arnold at the other end swung the ball within so precise a line...'. Congdon finished on 100no. Reporting after the close of play on day four, with New Zealand declaring their innings at 559/9 and England ending 224/2, Arlott comments 'New Zealand pressed towards the decision between a draw and their first win over England', England's chance of a win having already been written off by bookmakers. Arlott comments on how New Zealand 'strove to score quickly in the morning and urged on by some richly bibulous and exaggeratedly Antipodean exhortations from the tavern, bowled with all their hearts and fielded like dervishes'. In the fifth day's report Arlott notes the 'For the second time in successive Tests New Zealand had clear sight of their first win over against England; once more at Lord's yesterday, they could not grasp it... From hour to hour the balance of probability changed. In an atmosphere of dramatic suspense, New Zealand strove to win, England to save the game... Only in the last hour could England feel themselves truly safe'. Handwritten alterations and deletions in Arlott's hand. G/VG £140/180

*With the first two matches in the three Test series both drawn, New Zealand had the opportunity to win a series in England for the first time*

- 49 John Arlott. England v West Indies 1973. Four original typed manuscripts written by Arlott for articles for The Guardian newspaper. The reports covers the second Test, England v West Indies, Edgbaston, 9th-14th August 1973, with one article each for play on days one (four page article), two (five pages), four (four pages) and five (three pages). With the West Indies having won the toss and electing to bat, Arlott described the first day's play with 'England, with characteristic tenacity, confined West Indies to 190 runs for five wickets in a full six hours' play on a fair wicket... Only one West Indian played a significant innings: Fredericks... [who] batted all day for 98'. Having dropped a catch off Headley, Arlott states 'For Essex Fletcher constantly holds all but improbable catches; in Tests he seems

a compulsive dropper'. Illingworth bowled for three and a half hours, 'At one point Illingworth had bowled eighteen overs, thirteen of them maidens, for six runs'. Day two is summarised by Arlott as being of 'little pleasure for players or spectators... the standard of play fell from splendour to grim restriction... the possibility of the game being revived to a pleasurable entertainment is now depressingly distant'. West Indies has closed their innings 327 all out (Fredericks 150) and England closed on 96/0. Arlott also reports on a dispute before play started when 'one of the umpires, Arthur Fagg, declared he would withdraw from the match unless Kanhai apologised for his reaction to a decision of the previous day. The Warwickshire coach, Alan Oakman, 'stood' for the first over when Fagg came on, saying that all had been resolved'. At the close of play on day four Arlott reports that 'The harmony of reasonable competition [had] returned... West Indies finished the day 227 in front with five second innings left... a draw is still the likeliest outcome.' The report on the final day's play confirmed the predicted draw, 'which neither side deserved to win'. Hutton is responding to an enquiry about his first cap. 'I received My County cap at Bradford in 1936. There was nothing special about the occasion, just handed to me in the dressing room. - 63 A.A. Thomson, cricket author. Single page handwritten letter to Mr Coldham from his London address, dated 19th November 1955. "When I call to mind that the most brilliant exhibitions of batting and sterling defence that I have witnessed have been made at the time when "Umpires" were not decked with white coats, makes me come to the conclusion that the game would have flourished equally as well without this supposed adventitious aid to the batsmen - and I am quite sure that "W.G." and others... who originally performed without this adjunct... will be of the same opinion. I well recollect the first time I came across the white coats was at Scarborough... when my brother umpire brought out a couple of them and I chaffingly remarked for what are these for to keep us warm. No! he replied, they are to help the batsman to see better. See better I replied, well I have just lately watched Jupp in for two days and that is long enough for
- me - and he thought so too - and we did not wear them'. Thoms also writes of 'when England first met Australia at the "Oval" in 1880, the most historical and momentous match that was ever played or ever will be'. He recalls the brilliant batting of 'Lord Harris, "W.G.", Freddie Grace, A.P. Lucas, A.G. Steele, Barnes, Willie Murdoch and Percy McDonnell... and Prince Ranjitsinhji'. - Robert Arthur "Bob" Thoms (1826-1903) was a first-class cricket umpire who stood in two Test Matches, the first two played in England, in 1880 and 1882. - 76 Francis Gilbertson Justice Ford. Middlesex, Cambridge University & England 1886-1899. *Ford was one of three brothers to play for Middlesex*

- Robert Arthur 'Bob' Thoms (1826-1903) was a first-class cricket umpire who stood in two Test Matches, the first two played in England, in 1880 and 1882.*

Two page handwritten letter in ink dated 18th June 1889 from O'Brien to a lady collector requesting his autograph for a local Club. O'Brien also refers to an enquiry relating to a photograph, 'The only photograph of the Middlesex XI that I know of in 1888 was taken at Cheltenham for the newspaper called "Land & Water"'. - Arthur Collins famously scored 628no in a house match at Clifton College in 1899. Holloway attended Clifton at the same time as Collins*
- 88 Vyell Edward Walker. Middlesex 1859-1877. Two page handwritten letter in ink from Walker to the cricket author, W.A. Bettesworth, dated 9th February 1900. 'You have rather puzzled me however this time. Mr Pallini has been to see me re 'A Talk' in Wiltshire Post[?]. I told him a few things but said he must not interfere with you on any account. He said he would write to you'. Nicely signed V. Edward Walker. Some adhesive marks, otherwise in good condition £80/120
- Edward Walker was one of seven brothers, the 'Walkers of Southgate', who played for Middlesex. He captained Middlesex from 1864 to 1872*
- 89 Russell Donnithorne Walker. Oxford University & Middlesex 1861-1877. Single page handwritten letter in ink from Walker to 'Ben'. Written on Christmas Day (year unknown), Walker is writing, presumably in later years, to thank the correspondent for his staff's greetings and looks forward to future visits 'when the weather is suitable'. The letter is laid down to card with some underlining in red. G £60/90
- Russell Walker was one of seven brothers, the 'Walkers of Southgate', who played for Middlesex. In later years he served on the committees of Middlesex and M.C.C. and served as President of Middlesex from 1906 until his death in 1922*
- 90 Isaac Donnithorne Walker. Middlesex 1862-1884. Three page handwritten letter in ink from Walker to M.J.

- Dauglish (Middlesex 1886-1890, nine matches). The letter is undated but probably written c1885 when Dauglish was Captain of the Harrow eleven. Following defeat in a school match Walker writes, 'Having seen so much of the boys this year you will know pretty well what my feelings were on Saturday by comparing them with your own. I have seen 2 Old Harrovians today... each made the same remark "Why on earth weren't the lobs tried more 2nd Jun?"' 'He continues '...you have no cause to reproach yourself with the result; it was not your fault that in [the] 1st innings at any rate our batting & bowling were both sadly under the mark; and our general good fielding in the match was chiefly due to the trouble you took with the fellows during the term... It is no disgrace to be beaten by an Eleven that shewed such consistently good bowling...'. Nicely signed 'I.D. Walker'. Horizontal folds, otherwise in very good condition £100/150
- Isaac Walker was the youngest of the seven Walker brothers of Southgate who all played for Middlesex. He took over the Middlesex captaincy from his brother Edward in 1873, and held the position until 1884*
- 91 John Arlott. Single page handwritten letter in ink on Arlott's 'Invicta Productions Ltd' letterhead, dated 31st January 1957 to 'Mr [Ted] Brown', bookseller. Arlott is writing to say that if 'the New Zealand or the South African non-European Almanack- or any other souvenir or cricket item should appear, I might be able to add it to the Wisden review at proof stage'. Nicely signed 'John Arlott'. VG £30/50
- 92 K.A. Auty. Single page handwritten letter in ink on Chicago Cricket Club letterhead dated 22nd February 1949 to J.D. Coldham. Auty is replying to a Coldham letter concerning copies of Auty's annuals, having had spent around \$10,000 in producing the annuals as a hobby. Auty refers to his old friend, Aubrey Smith, who had died recently and had helped him with distribution in the Far West of the States, helping to raise money for the British War Effort. The two men had been friends in the UK before they both moved to the States. He also mentions his own 'Cricket Xmas cards' of which he prints 475 each year 'but I had so many enquiries for more that I had to have them reprinted'. He closes with a reminder to Coldham that he is still looking for an 1875 Wisden., and asks 'Who bought the Chas Britton collection?'. Signed K.A. Auty. - 93 Ronald Gorell Barnes. Oxford University & M.C.C. 1906-1920. Single page handwritten letter with accompanying poem, both on Lord's Cricket Ground letterhead. The letter to 'My Dear Harry [Altham] dated 10th July 1959 relates to 'some lines I scribbled on my way to Lord's this morning... They are the first, on cricket, I have written since the ones, now some years ago... dedicated to our dear old friend, Bill Findlay'. The opening lines of the poem read, 'Poor tottering mortal, did you then replay/ The games you joyed in fifty years ago'. The letter and poem both signed 'Gorell'. G/VG £50/80
- 94 John Betjeman. Poet, writer and broadcaster. Single page typed letter on 43, Cloth Fair, London letterhead dated 15th December 1960. Writing to P.A.L. Barling, Betjeman states, 'I can't make definite arrangements more than three months ahead now; if I do I find I am always having to cancel things. If you will write again in, say, July, I can let you have a definite answer'. Signed in ink 'John Betjeman'. At the time Barling was responsible for organising functions for the Cricket Society. - Betjeman, a keen cricket follower, was Poet Laureate from 1972 until his death in 1984, and was a founding member of the Victorian Society*
- 95 Frederick Gale. Handwritten twelve page letter written in Manitoba, Canada, dated 1st December 18932, to his friend 'Mr [R.S.] Holmes'. 'Can you help one in a fix? My portmanteau was stolen on my way here and was picked up on the trail 8 months afterwards & nothing left in but wearing apparel which was marked with my name'. Most important to Gale was the loss of his only copy of Public School Matches of 1853 and also a later edition and he asks if Holmes can lend him his copy 'as I want to copy the pictures'. Gale, living with his son and feeling in much better health is enjoying shooting geese and getting exercise. Much on life in the prairies and the extreme cold, interlaced with talk of cricket back in England: O'Brien, Grace, Fuller Pilch, Steele, the over-use of pads and leg protection, etc. 'Do you know any Editor who needs a correspondent? - 2000 words and no padding?' - Fred Gale played in the Winchester Eleven in 1841 against Eton and Harrow at Lord's, but did not go on to play first class cricket. He made his name as a prolific writer of books, newspaper and magazine articles writing under the name 'The Old Buffer'. He had emigrated to Canada to be with his family after the death of one of his sons, but was homesick and missed his cricket, so returned home the following year*
- 96 Marquess of Granby, 8th Duke of Rutland. Single page handwritten letter to 'Sir Spenser [Ponsonby]', dated 2nd March 1910 thanking Ponsonby for proposing him once again for the MCC Committee. 'I will joyfully accept it if I am selected'. Granby was a joint editor of 'Outdoor Games: Cricket and Golf published in 1901'. G £80/120
- 97 John Berry 'Jack' Hobbs. Surrey & England 1905-1934. Two page handwritten letter in ink dated 20th July 1931 to 'Mr Pilleau'. Hobbs is writing regarding 'the pictures you ordered at Horsham'. Hobbs continues, 'It is now settled that I shall play for Surrey again next year but I shall be allowed to stand down when I wish... Glad to hear the news about the bat, it should belong to you after all the trouble & expense you were put to'. Signed 'J.B. Hobbs'. Some foxing and staining affecting the signature, otherwise in good condition £60/90
- 98 Douglas Robert Jardine. Surrey & England 1921-1933. Three page handwritten letter dated 10th September 1934 on the headed paper of United University Club to 'Mr Wagg'. Jardine is writing to thank Wagg for Raven Hill's original cartoon of the Ashes 1934, which 'will make an amusing sequel to the

- original of 1932 which I also have'. Raven Hill was an accomplished artist and cartoonist of the time. Jardine wants Wagg to meet 'a friend of mine Clifford Bax (who wrote "The Rose without a Thorn"); he is another enthusiast on things Indian' and invites Wagg to dinner to meet Bax. 'I can't help feeling that some day you and he should tour India together- for some years he practised yoga'. The two pages are joined together with tape. The original letter is accompanied by a typed transcript. G/VG £100/150
- 99 John Richard Mason. Kent & England 1893-1914. Single page handwritten letter dated 24th January 1944. Mason is replying to a request for a signed photograph. 'I also return your Postal Order which will not be required'. VG £40/60
- 100 Reverend Ward Maule. Cambridge University & Gentlemen of Kent 1853-1854. Three page handwritten letter written from the Pas de Calais, France, dated 27th August 1903 to an un-named correspondent (possibly J D Betham), confirming his appearances for Cambridge and for the Gentlemen of Kent. Maule also lists other matches he played including for the Quidnuncs, and refers to Ranji who considered the Quidnuncs to be the 'Cream of Cambridge Cricket'. He mentions bowling the great Fuller Pilch at Tunbridge Wells. - 101 Keith Ross Miller. Victoria, New South Wales, Nottinghamshire & Australia 1937-1959. Four page typed letter with annotations in Miller's hand. Miller is writing to say how much he enjoyed Arlott's 'The Echoing Green' and how flattered he is by Arlott's comments, 'Surely I am not that good'. Miller suggests Arlott should look at Jim de Courcy, 'Short like Hassett, he's a beautiful batsman but goes for his shots all the time'. He also refers to 'Young Flockton too is an attractive bat, with a bright future. Graeme Hole could be a beauty but loves to cross bat anything on leg stump and wider. Burke who made a 100 in first Test is [a] hard player to fit into any team... Young Benaud is at the moment a useful cricketer. That's all. Thoms and McDonald are complete opposites'. He concludes by looking forward to playing Skittles with Arlott at Taunton. A very good Miller letter. G/VG £100/150
- 102 Eric Alfred Burchell Rowan. Transvaal, Eastern Province & South Africa 1929-1954. Four page handwritten letter from Rowan to an unknown correspondent. The letter is undated, but appears to have been written following the 1949/50 Australia tour to South Africa and prior to the 1950 South Africa tour to England. Regarding the Australians, Rowan writes, 'The Aussies were a good side but not the world beaters we made them look. The reasons for our own dismal failures are legion so I will not bother you with them now but if I write a book next year I will most certainly speak my mind'. Regarding the impending tour to England, 'Athol and I are both fit and playing hockey for Jeppe. His leg is as good as it will ever be & provided he is well managed should give your batsmen a rough time next year'. The letter appears to be lacking the first page. Sold with a mono press photograph of Rowan in batting action, dated 13th May 1951, signed by Rowan. G/VG £40/60
- 103 Raymond Charles Robertson-Glasgow. Oxford University & Somerset 1920-1935. Original two page handwritten letter dated 23rd May 1952 on The Observer newspaper letterhead, replying to a request to provide a 'Grace Before Dinner at Cricket Matches' for a cricket society dinner. Signed 'R.C. Robertson-Glasgow'. Accompanying the letter are two cards written by Robertson-Glasgow each with two four line alternative forms of Grace composed by him. Sold with two mono press photographs one of Robertson-Glasgow playing golf, the other of him seated reading a newspaper. G/VG £30/50
- 104 Gilbert Ashton. Cambridge University and Worcestershire 1919-1936. Two page handwritten letter dated 3rd November 1972 from Ashton to the cricket historian J.D. Coldham. Ashton has just received his copy of the Journal of the Cricket Society for Autumn 1972 and is writing to thank Coldham for including an article by Arthur Gibbons on 'The Ashton Brothers, a draft of which when it was in preparation he sent to both my brother and myself. He took infinite trouble over its production & I am writing to him to express our gratitude & to thank him for the many kind things he has said'. Ashton closes by requesting a further six copies. Nicely signed 'Gilbert Ashton'. In a postscript Ashton recalls playing with Oliver Leese in the Eton v Winchester match of June 1914. 'Alas six of each side were killed in the '14-'18 war'. He also relates 'when I bowled a maiden over to Don Bradman in 1930. We hadn't met before and I think the great man suspected me of being about to bowl a leg-break with an off-break action. He soon discovered the truth. No more maidens to Bradman'. He continues by discussing the Test series against Australia and how Denis Compton 'remarked that Test cricketers are "public entertainers". I'm afraid not. In hard fact they are there primarily to hold or win the Ashes'. He also considers the forthcoming tour to South Africa and laments the exclusion of Colin Cowdrey and Tom Graveney, 'By any standards great batsmen and great batsmen are as rare as great poets' and points out that with Graveney aged 37, 'did not Sir Jack Hobbs score 100 of his 197 centuries in First Class cricket after he'd passed his fortieth year?'. He concludes by considering M.C. Lyon of Somerset whom he considers to have been of Test class but was never selected, 'he was a terrific hooker and cutter, but his peculiar glory was the drive, off or straight. Above all he enjoyed the battle'. The article is signed 'R.C. Robertson-Glasgow to the first page, and 'R.C.R-G' to the final page. 'The captain of the fielding team is not having one of his best days. When he crams the off side with fielders, his slow and fast bowlers both bowl to the leg; and when like any observant tactician, he

- transfers most of his fielders to the leg, his bowlers bowl to the off... The captain advances enjoyably to 75, when he is adjudged L.B.W. to a ball that he has received with his midriff... and while lending his batting-gloves to the incoming Number 5, says "Look out, he's bowling for L.B.W's"... The captain is soon proved wise in his advice, as Number 5, 6 and 7 are all adjudged L.B.W. to the fast bowler by the Visiting Umpire, Number 6 perhaps the most unlucky, as he has been hit on the adam's-apple by a near-wide to leg...'. Regarding Hammond's bowling, 'It had in it the seeds of greatness, though not always the full bloom'. However, 'Great, then as Hammond's fielding was, anywhere, great as his bowling could be at times, it is as a batsman, and so as an all-rounder, that he joins the immortals... Psychologically, as he approached the wicket, you feel that he was the king and that the other white clad figures on the green were his courtiers'. Robertson-Glasgow concludes the article with a full description of Hammond's batting achievements, 'In 1928 he took with
- him from Gloucestershire a batting average of 82.46, with 9 centuries, and soon was continuing the show in [the 1929/29 M.C.C. tour to] Australia... 251 in the second Test at Sydney, 200 and 32 in the third, at Melbourne, 119 and 177 in the fourth at Adelaide... four years later, four consecutive Test innings in the Antipodes:- 101 and 75 not out against Australia, 227 and 336 against New Zealand'. The most pleasing features in the two games have been the bowling of Tate and the batting of Sutcliffe and Hobbs. Though their magnificent efforts failed to secure victory for England, one feels that the prestige of English cricket is nevertheless re-established'. He also recounts the praise given by the Australian press to the English efforts and performances... Perhaps the praise is at times a little fulsome, but surely many readers today would still prefer the blanket to the scorpion? Anyhow, the modern cult of damnation is hard to bear, for players and readers alike.' He also refers to the anonymity of the writer, 'The Onlooker', 'a pen-name that
- conceals the identity of a very prominent figure in the game'. He concludes by remembering the recently deceased Frank Mann, 'he was one of my heroes. He was courageous and kind, courteous and witty; with a dignity that was yet born of calmness and humour... As a batsman, he was equally calculating whether in defence or in those sudden and titanic assaults on the bowling'. The article is signed 'R.C. [Graveney] has suffered in public estimation from an apparent distaste for the hurly-burly... phrases reflecting on his temperament or on his fighting qualities under pressure have been bandied about... what has never been in dispute is the beauty of Graveney's stroke play, the correctness of his technique, his poise and general assurance... he remains with Wardle the most wasted and neglected of England's post-war cricketers...'. Ross continues by listing Graveney's many county and Test achievements, how he is 'incapable of an ugly stroke... devoid of violence and impetuosity'. He considers how Graveney had changed over ten years, 'Where once there was a faint air of complacency, a disinvolved virtuosity, there is [now] a greater astringency, sterner application...'. Ross also describes how Graveney's inconsistencies were in part due to circumstances, 'But it remains a fact that in his five series against Australia he failed either to clinch his place or fully to impose himself in a fashion commensurate with his gifts... but on the evidence of the present the result is pure loss'. - 340 William Henry 'Harry' Fryer. Kent 1852-1872. Meerschaum smoking pipe presented to Fryer. Silver metal band to shaft has the inscription 'Presented to Mr W.H. - William Henry Fryer, known as Harry Fryer, was an English cricketer and played for Kent County Cricket Club between 1852 and 1872, initially as a wicket-keeper and later as a batsman and bowler. Fryer made his first-class cricket debut for Kent in July 1852 against Sussex, the team included Mynn, Felix and Adams. He played 75 times for Kent, but after losing an eye in an accident where he was thrown from a trap in 1862, Fryer continued to play cricket although he no longer keep wicket on a regular basis. He took 8-40 for Kent against an England side at Lord's in 1864, the best bowling figures of his first-class career. He continued playing county cricket until 1872 when he made his final first-class appearance for Kent and continued playing for Mote Park until 1879. He went on to be an 'excellent' umpire and was considered 'in every way a worthy man' by Wisden. He died at Loose near Maidstone in Kent in 1919 aged 89.*

In reply Cambridgeshire scored 329 with Robert Carpenter making 100 and Thomas Hayward 108, Sewell and Mortlock taking six wickets between them. In Surrey's second innings they made 259 with Caesar scoring 111, Bell and Hayward taking a further eight wickets between them. Cambridgeshire struggled to make the total required, but eventually with two wickets in hand they won the match with Hayward making 46, Sewell taking five wickets. Other players playing in this early match were Caffyn, Lockyer, Diver, Tarrant etc.*

*Henry Perkins was an English lawyer, cricketer and cricket administrator. He played first-class cricket for Cambridge University, Cambridge Town Club (Cambridgeshire), Marylebone Cricket Club and various amateur sides between 1854 and 1868, and he was the secretary of the MCC from 1876 to 1898.*

*Frederick Lillywhite, a member of the famous Sussex cricketing family, but made his name as a sports outfitter, publisher and cricketing entrepreneur. By the time he was 20 he had produced the first edition of The Guide To Cricketers which ran through to his death in 1866, a book which was loosely the forerunner of the more famous Wisden Cricketers' Almanack. In 1859 he accompanied George Parr's professional side on the groundbreaking tour to North America, fulfilling the role of scorer. He also took a tent and a mobile scoring wagon, and subsequently published the definite account of the trip. In 1862 he published Scores and Biographies, the first major work on the game in almost a century, as well as scorecards of matches. He died in 1866 at the age of 37*

- 364 'George Burton. 10 wickets in the match'. Surrey v Middlesex 1888. Original and scarce silk scorecard for the match played at the Kennington Oval on the 19th-21st July 1888. George Burton (Middlesex 1881-1893) in the Surrey first innings took all ten Surrey wickets for fifty nine runs from 52.3 overs with 25 maiden overs. Fully printed match details. Odd very minor faults otherwise in good/very good condition. A rare and early commemorative silk scorecard

- In a closely fought low scoring match, Surrey won the match by three wickets. - 365 M.C.C. & Ground v Australians 1878. Early printed scorecard for the match played at Lord's on the 27th and 28th of May 1878. Australia beat M.C.C. by nine wickets in a very low scoring game. How are you?" & there was Lindwall... when we parted & I said, naturally, "Well, good luck to you tomorrow" Ray replied that he didn't want any luck at all. All he (and the others) wanted was for Lindsay [Hasset] to win the toss so that they could spend the day with their feet up'. Relating to the statistics [s]he writes 'Please forgive my lateness in sending the stuff along. The rest will follow as & when ready, in the hope that staleness will not affect the validity of the conclusions to be drawn by the facts. Regarding Appleyard's illness, the correspondent writes, 'Your absence has thrown the whole side out of gear... Your return could make them once more into the fine side they could & should be, so get better soon'. After recovering, Appleyard made a remarkable return to the Yorkshire side for the 1954 season finishing second in the bowling averages with 154 wickets at an average of 14.42, presumably armed with the information gleaned regarding opposition batsmen's weaknesses! **ITEMS FROM THE COLLECTION  
OF LEO HARRISON  
(Hampshire 1939-1966)**

*Leo Harrison was a right-hand bat and wicketkeeper who made his first-class debut in 1939 aged 17. He played 396 matches for Hampshire, scoring 8,854 runs at an average of 17.49. His career highest score was 153. In all, he scored 6 centuries. An outstanding fielder, after the War he became Hampshire's first choice wicketkeeper taking a total of 573 catches and 103 stumpings despite poor eyesight which required him to play in glasses, and was a member of the Hampshire side that won the County Championship for the first time in 1961. His final match for Hampshire was in 1966 making him the last professional player from the pre-War years to play first-class cricket after the War. In the 1960s he took up coaching positions in Argentina and Rhodesia, as well as at Hampshire. Harrison was a close friend of John Arlott who described him as "Honest as the day and a trier to the last gasp himself, he finds it hard to forgive anything which is not straight, or any cricket played with less than full effort. Know Leo Harrison and you must trust him and like him".*

#### **MICHAEL HENRY DENNESS. KENT & ENGLAND 1962-1976**

Michael Henry Denness OBE was a Scottish born cricketer who played for Kent, Essex, England and Scotland. He made his debut for Kent in 1962 and played 330 matches for the county between 1962 and 1976 before moving to Essex. In total he scored over 25,000 first class runs with a highest score of 195. He captained Kent between 1972 and 1976 and had major success winning the John Player League three times (1972, 1973, 1976), the Benson & Hedges Cup twice (1973, 1976), and the Gillette Cup in 1974, and

captained England in nineteen Tests between 1973/74 and 1975 including the Test tours of 1973/74 to the West Indies and to Australia in 1974/75. He was a Wisden Cricketer of the Year in 1975 and remains the only England captain to be born in Scotland. Denness later became an ICC match referee. He was president of Kent County Cricket Club in 2012/13. This collection of blazers are being sold by the family
