However, Hobbs and Sutcliffe put on an opening partnership of 172 before Hobbs was out for exactly 100, Sutcliffe going on to make 161, and England ended their second innings at 436 leaving Australia needing 414 to clinch the series. However, four wickets from Wilfred Rhodes and three from Harold Larwood led England to dismiss Australia for 125 and victory by 289 runs to regain The Ashes

England were bowled out for 251 in their second innings, Hornibrook taking 7-92 for Australia to clinch victory and the series

August Bank Holiday 1904 was 'happily favoured with fine weather' and George Hirst was having his benefit after twelve years of service to the club. A total of 78,681 people came into the ground and receipts of £3,702, 2s & 3d were unprecedented and only exceeded 21 years later when Roy Kilner collected

£4016, 19s & 3d. Lancashire Captain, Archie MacLaren unwisely invited Yorkshire to bat first and they batted for seven hours in total despite having to recover from 143 for five. Ernest Smith, missed before he had scored, was bowled by James Hallows for 98. Hirst made 65, John Tunnicliffe 55 and Lord Hawke 54. Hirst removed MacLaren, Reggie Spooner and Johnny Tyldesley in his first three overs and finished with six for 42 as Lancashire were all out for 173 in response to Yorkshire's 403. So Lancashire had to save the game on the Wednesday which they did as Tyldeslev made an undefeated 108. The match was drawn, Lancashire finished on 163-3

Lancashire won the County Championship in the 1904 season, not losing a match. Yorkshire finished in 2nd place having lost only two matches all season. In the 1904 season, George Hirst averaged scored 2501 first class runs at an average of 54.36 with nine centuries and took 132 wickets at an average of 21.09

The recipient of the scorebook, Peter Dawson, we presume is the well-known Glaswegian whisky distiller and entrepreneur who during the Australian tour of England 1909 invited the team on a fourteen day motor tour through Scotland as his guests, the team included Warwick Armstrong. The 1921 tour was Armstrong's swan song in first-class cricket. On the journey back to Australia, he suffered a relapse of the malaria that had plagued him since his earlier visit to Malaya. This kept him from taking part in any of the matches in South Africa, allowing Herbie Collins to captain Australia for the first time. Armstrong resigned from his job with Melbourne Cricket Club and drawing on contacts he had made while on tour took a role as an agent for Dawson's Scotch Whisky. He remained in the liquor trade until his retirement in 1946.

As a footnote and reflection of Dawson's showmanship as well as the export potential of his whiskies, cases of Peter Dawson Special and Old Curio blended whiskies were on board the S.S. Politician when she ran aground off the Hebridean island of Eriskay in 1941. That event and those of the following days inspired Sir Compton Mackenzie's tale, Whisky Galore!

Quote from Bill Ferguson's autobiography 'Mr Cricket' 1957. Page 56 'I made a study of cricket scoring because I was in the unique position of having to earn a living at it. I use a score book of my own design, a book which contains at least twice as much information as any other in the world and, at the conclusion of each day's play, I copy all the important figures into a more orthodox book which is kept as

the official record of the tour. Very jealous of the secrets contained in my own book, I have resisted many attempts by managers, skippers and players to commandeer it'.

Out of the ground for 6' (5) [with preliminary sketch to verso], Crawford and Richard A. Young (Cambridge University, Sussex & England)1905-1925 (nickname Blurr, he went to Repton School with Crawford) walking out in Sydney 'Giving the Sydney Girls a treat' (6), Hutchings, Crawford and Young, in individual beds, Young having nightmares (due to his poor performance in the first Test) 'Bad luck Fielder!, well bowled!' (7), two images of the same Australian crowd at the first Test, one smiling and happy, the other troubled entitled 'Australia doing well, Australian wickets falling fast' (8), the proof sheet depicting an English Lion and a Australian Kangaroo, England doing well by the Wednesday evening and not so well by the Thursday' evening entitled 'An Australian Caricature' (9), Tarrant batting slowly in the tour match with a Victorian XI following the Test, the illustration shows members of the team including Crawford making comments around Tarrant with caption 'Cricket- A matter of endurance' (10), a batsman being given out by the umpire, with Crawford bowling, entitled 'You've had two or three very narrow squeaks before, my boy' (11), an excellent image of Barnes and Fielder walking off triumphantly with bats over their shoulders having scored the 40 runs required to win the second Test by one wicket, entitled 'The two bowlers whose batting won the second Test' (12), head and shoulders image of a very hot Crawford wearing a boater and smoking a cigarette entitled 'Blisters!' due to the high temperatures in the Third Test at Adelaide (13), 'Blurr fishing', image showing Blurr (R.A. Young) fishing with a rod, in the River Tamar [Tasmania] whilst in the water himself (14), Crawford in batting attire pondering the fact that he almost made a pair in the fourth Test at Melbourne (he made 0 & 1) (15), Crawford and Hutchings eating oysters and drinking ginger beer entitled 'Could you eat another dozen Hutch, What! a bad one?' (16), the seventeenth illustration depicts Clem Hill walking into bat with wicket keeper Humphries looking on entitled 'The Invalid. Do I look very seedy Boys. (Clem Hill, 3rd Test Match)'. (17). [Hill had spent two days in bed ill with influenza during the Test, whilst England had been in the field and then made 160 runs...], an excellent illustration showing George Gunn sitting on the top of a cricket bat with other leading run scorers, Hardstaff, Jones,

Hobbs etc positioned below, the caption reads 'The Gunn mounted, top of the Averages' (18) [Gunn topped the tour batting averages with 831 runs at 51.93 with a highest score of 122no], the penultimate illustration features Crawford and Len Braund plus the rest of the team dashing to catch the ship home 'The Race for the boat and home' (19) and the final illustration shows Jones (the England Captain) shaking hands with Monty Noble (the Australian Captain) with caption 'Au Revoir!. The English cricket team in Australia in 1907–08 lost the Test series, and with it the Ashes, 4–1. They were handicapped by Arthur Jones, their captain, having to miss the first three Tests through illness. Frederick Fane led the side during Jones' absence. George Gunn, in Australia for the good of his health, was called into the touring party to bolster the batting and was a great success, scoring two hundreds including one on his Test debut, and scoring 462 runs at an average of 51.33. Nevertheless, England's batting was fragile throughout the series, with only Kenneth Hutchings scoring a hundred in addition to Gunn. Jack Hobbs made his England debut in the second Test, the only one which England won, scoring 83 and 28, and he had the next best average to Gunn. The bowling relied on Jack Crawford, Arthur Fielder and Sydney Barnes, who took 79 wickets between them. England lost the first Test by only two wickets, and ought to have won the third. In the latter match, Clem Hill coming in at number 9 in Australia's second innings because of an attack of influenza made 160. He added 243 for the eighth wicket with Hartigan (116), their partnership turning the match. Jack Crawford had a successful tour all round, the overall tour averages stating he took

72 wickets at 23.90 and made 635 runs at an average of 26.45 with a highest score of 114. He also took 17 catches.

John Neville Crawford (1886-1963) played mainly for Surrey and South Australia. An amateur, he played as an all-rounder. As a right-handed batsman, Crawford had a reputation for scoring quickly and hitting He powerful shots. bowled medium-paced off spin and was noted for his accuracy and his ability to make the ball turn sharply from the pitch. Unusually for a first-class cricketer, Crawford wore spectacles while playing. Crawford established a reputation as an outstanding cricketer while still a schoolboy. He played Test cricket for England before he was 21 years old, and successfully toured South Africa with the M.C.C. in 1905/06 and Australia with the MCC in 1907-08. He played only 12 matches for England, although critics believed he had a great future in the sport and was a potential future England captain. In two successive English seasons, he completed the double of 1,000 runs and 100 wickets in first-class games.

A dispute over the composition of a Surrey side chosen to play a high-profile game against Australia in 1909, after several professional players were omitted for disciplinary reasons, led to an increasingly bitter disagreement between Crawford and the Surrey authorities. Crawford was told he had no future with the club, and moved to Australia. There, he worked as a teacher and continued his cricket career with South Australia. This arrangement had a controversial end, when he clashed with the South Australian Cricket Association over money and moved to New Zealand to play for Otago. That relationship also ended badly, and he left Otago before being conscripted into the New Zealand armed forces near the end of the First World War. When he was demobilised, he returned to England and made his peace with Surrey. He played a handful of games between 1919 and 1921 but faded out of first-class cricket to pursue a career in industry. In all first-class cricket, Crawford scored 9,488 runs at an average of 32.60 and took 815 wickets at an average of 20.66.

Fred Gale played in the Winchester Eleven in 1841 against Eton and Harrow at Lord's, and played two first class matches in 1845. He made his name as a prolific writer of books, newspaper and magazine articles writing under the name 'The Old

Buffer'. Some of his library including author's copies had been sold by

Sotheby's in 1891 when Gale left England for Canada, a move which turned out not to be permanent.

William Percival Pickering emigrated to Canada in 1852 and was the chief organiser of the inaugural English tour to Canada in 1959.

Vyell Edward Walker was considered at one time to be the best all-round amateur cricketer in England. He captained Middlesex from 1864-1872.

George Frederick Brabazon Ponsonby, 6th Earl of Bessborough, together with his brother, Spencer Cecil Brabazon Ponsonby-Fane, founded the I Zingari Cricket Club in 1845.

Robert Montague Poole (Europeans, Hampshire & South Africa 1892-1914) played in three Tests for South Africa in 1895/96. His first-class cricket in England was restricted due to his military duties, but he finished the 1899 season as the leading batsman, scoring 1551 runs at an average of 91.23 including a top score of 304 against Somerset at Taunton.

Padwick 677-1 refers to an unseen typescript of a book by Poore on cricket technique dated 1928, and it is assumed that this Ranjitsinhji title was used as source material
