CRICKET EPHEMERA

W.G. Grace. 'Souvenir of the National Testimonial to Dr. W.G. Grace, July 22nd 1879, with Photograph and Record of Performances. Sixpence.' Printed by the Cricket and Football Times, Ludgate Circus, London. [1879], Attractive printed card with title within chromolithographed border of flowers, holly etc. To inside pages is a mounted portrait photograph of Grace, with a record of his averages in first class matches, averages in county matches and scores over 100 in first class matches from 1864 to 1878 printed opposite. Previously sold by Knights in 2016. The card measures 3.5"x4.75" and has some minor foxing, minor wear to covers, slight splitting to fold. A rare and early example of Grace memorabilia. £300/400

Grace was the recipient of two national testimonials. The first was presented to him by Lord Fitzhardinge at Lord's on 22 July 1879 in the form of a marble clock, two bronze ornaments and a cheque for £1,458. The second, collected by MCC, the county of Gloucestershire, the Daily Telegraph and The Sportsman, amounted to £9,703 and was presented to him in 1896 in appreciation of his 'Indian Summer' season of 1895 when he scored his 100th first class hundred.

2 W.G. Grace. 'Banquet held on Monday, June 24th 1895 at the Victoria Rooms, Clifton to Mr W.G. Grace in celebration of his One Hundredth Century, completed on Gloucestershire County Ground in match Somersetshire v Gloucestershire, on Friday May 17th 1895'. Original three page folding card menu for the Banquet, the cover with excellent pictorial colour decoration showing crossed bats, ball and stumps, titles to centre and to lower border an image of a cricket match in progress with Grace batting with '100' on the scoreboard. To inside pages menu, toast list, wine list, poem by E.B.V. Christian to Grace, portrait of Grace and list of hundreds. Speeches included The Duke of Beaufort, E.M. Grace, E.G. Clarke etc. Previously sold by Knights in 2016. The menu has split at folds which have unfortunately been taped, some staining and soiling to menu otherwise in good condition. A rare item of Grace memorabilia.

Grace completed his one hundredth century by making his highest first class score of 288 v Somerset in the

'Farewell Dinner to Dr W.G. Grace 1898'. Original menu card for the Dinner, given by the Clifton Foot Beagles, held at the Clifton Down Hotel on December 6th 1898. Decorative and colourful front cover, with green ribbon tie, with images of hunting horn, whistle, riding cap and whip and titles, menu and toast list to inside pages with further decorative hunting images to rear cover. Printed by 'W. Bennett, 43 Broad Street'. The toast list includes, His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, W.G. Grace etc. Originally from the collection of C.L. Townsend (Gloucestershire & England 1893-1922), this being Townsend's copy. Previously sold by Knights in March 2012 and again in 2019. Some minor foxing and age toning otherwise in good/very good condition. Rare. £200/300

W.G. Grace, who was Vice Chairman of the Clifton Foot Beagles until early 1899, regularly ran with the beagles up until leaving Gloucestershire and moving the Grace family to London, following the death of his only daughter Bessie, in 1899

'Player's Please' c.1930s. Unusual free-standing colour advertising display card produced by John Player and Sons depicting the raised figures of an England batsman (possibly Wally Hammond) and Australian(?) fielder. In the background is a full grandstand and scoreboard showing the score at 225 for 3, batsman no. 4 having scored 100. In the sky, the face of W.G. Grace looks down on the scene. 9.25"x12". 'Two Great Players' c.1930s. Original colour advertising display card produced by for John Player & Sons Navy Cut cigarettes depicting a partially cut-out figure of Frank Woolley in batting pose beside a cigarette packet, on a green background. On reaching the milestone, Percy Fender brought a glass of Seymour's ginger beer out to toast Hobbs, as he was teetotal. Hobbs went onto make 199 first class hundreds in his cricketing career, a record to this day.

Wetherdair Limited of Bradford and London, were manufacturers of medium to high class chemically waterproofed rainwear for men, women and children, popular in the 1930s-1950s, including the 'Style 555 Wetherdair "Olympix" Weather Coats'.

Jack Hobbs reached the milestone of one hundred first class centuries playing for Surrey v Somerset at Bath, 5th-8th May 1923. He scored 0 in the first innings, and 116no in the second to help Surrey to a narrow victory by ten runs.

The Evening News ran from 1881 to 1980 when it was incorporated in to the Evening Standard.

'Hornibrook 6 for 5 Essex Rout'.

Large original newspaper poster for the 'Home' edition of the [London] Evening News, dated 8th May 1930. The poster measures approx. 20"x30", framed and glazed overall 24"x34". Horizontal and vertical folds, with small loss to right edge and top corner, otherwise in good/very good condition. £150/180

The poster refers to the Australians' tour match against Essex played at Leyton, 7th- 9th May 1930. Percy Hornibrook ended the first innings with figures of six wickets for eleven runs off nine overs with Essex being

dismissed for 67. He took a further four wickets in the second innings, returning match figures of 10/40, the Australians winning by 207 runs.

2 'W.G.'s Son Drops Dead at Cricket'. Large original newspaper poster for the Daily Herald, dated 7th June 1938. The poster measures approx. 20"x30", framed and glazed overall 22.5"x33". Horizontal and vertical folds, with apparent old tape repairs to verso, otherwise in good, very good condition. £180/250

Charles Butler Grace, who played four first-class matches 1900-1906 for London County and W.G. Grace's XI, died in Sussex in 1938 He collapsed and died whilst batting during a match at Bexhill on Whit-Monday on 6th June 1938.

'The Sportsman Alamanac 1902. 'The Sportsman' is the Oldest, Largest and Leading Sporting Daily Paper'. Large original rare poster for 1902 season. Printed by Merritt & Hatcher, London. The colourful poster features to the top half of the poster a large printed panel with cameo images of various sizes of members of 'Australian Tour 1901-02. Mr A.C. Maclaren's English Eleven. Players featured include Maclaren, Ranjitsinghi, McGregor, Jephson, Lord Hawke, Barnes, J. Gunn, Quiafe, Blythe, Hayward, Jones, Jessop, Braund etc with calender months printed to either side. To the lower half of the poster are 'The Sportsman's list of principal [horse] races in 1902' with two cameo, one of the late George Lohmann (he died in December 1901) and leading jockey D. Maher. The poster printed in red, blue and black on a white background. The poster is framed and glazed and measures overall 19.5"x24.5". Very light folds to poster and slight loss to the top right hand corner otherwise in very good condition for its age. An excellent piece of early ephemera with Ashes interest £150/250

Australia tour to England 1896. The Times of London newspaper. Four original and complete copies of issues dated 26th and 27th May 1896 with coverage of the Australians tour match against Yorkshire. Also 22nd June 1896, page 13 with confirmation of the England team for the

1st Test at Lord's commencing that day, and a report of the conclusion of the Australian's tour match v Midland Counties at Edgbaston. 23rd June 1896, page 14 with a lengthy full column report on the first day's play of the first Test, with Australia dismissed for 53, England closing at 286/8. "Jessop's Match", printed in green ink with gilt edges and rounded corners, marking England's victory by one wicket, with Gilbert Jessop scoring 104. Printed by Merritt & Hatcher at the "Cricket" Office, London. Also original scorecards for the Lord's Test, tour matches at Lord's v M.C.C. and v Middlesex, and v C.I. Thornton's XI at Scarborough. The other albums comprise two volumes covering the English first-class season of 1902, one volume for the Australians tour to South Africa 1902, Lord Hawke's team to New Zealand & Australia. and Oxford Authentics to India 1902/03. The final album covers the M.C.C. tour to Australia 1903/04 including the selection of the team, the voyage to Australia, tour matches and the Ashes series etc. Other original scorecards are London County v Surrey, Crystal Palace 1903, M.C.C. v Derbyshire, Lord's 1903, Middlesex v Somerset, v Yorkshire, and v Gloucestershire, Lord's 1903. PHOTOGRAPHS AND POSTCARDS FROM THE JOE GOLDMAN COLLECTION

Joseph Wolfe Goldman. The following collection of signed photographs were collected and collated by J.W. Goldman, best known for compiling one of the finest private collection of cricket books in the world. His collection also comprised over 4,000 signatures (many of which were signed to photographs, a good selection of which are offered here), also prints, cigarette cards, scorecards, ceramics, bronzes etc. In 1965 he decided to sell his collection. Unable to find a private buyer, he put the collection up for sale by auction in 1966, a time when specialist cricket sales were rare. Goldman also published two books, the first a bibliography of cricket published in 1937, predated Padwick by some forty years. A keen cricket player and enthusiast, he was apparently a spectator at W.G. Grace's final first-class match. His own playing career was curtailed when he was wounded in action at Passchendaele in World War I. Goldman died in 1978 aged 85 in a Sunbury on Thames nursing home near his home in Egham.

There was talk of making Botham a Hollywood star and indeed he did visit Hollywood with Hudson but eventually they split it and Hudson returned to America. The blazer was sold. I believe by a London Auction house in the 1990's, and then eventually bought by the present vendor who has had the sleeves shortened slightly to enable him to wear it, looking at the sleeves it appears that this could be reversed with enough striped cloth available in the sleeve, otherwise in good condition £400/600

Succeeded by Peter Roebuck in 1986, unrest in the dressing room led to the sacking of their two West Indian players, Viv Richards and Joel Garner, and Botham himself resigned at the end of that season

The hand and arm measure approximately 11' long. The hand and ball, which was apparently produced to commemorate W.G. Grace's 41st Birthday, July 18th 1889, is beautifully and very skilfully sculptured showing the finger and thumb nails, the wrinkles around the finger joints and palm, the knuckles and veins in the back of the hand with a lovely patina to the bronze. Knights have previously sold a pair of early similar photographs, one showing the large bust of Grace made in 1888 by artist William Henry Tyler with annotation and the other showing the life size hand of Grace holding a cricket ball. The photograph of the hand of Grace is annotated in ink to lower border 'Hand of Dr. W.G. Grace cast in plaster on his 41st birthday (Price in bronze). The ink annotation to both photographs is in the same hand. Both items were made within a year of each other and although purely conjecture, it is entirely possible that Tyler made the life size hand as

well as the bust? Having contacted many well known long standing collectors, museums and institutions with enquiries regarding the hand. this auctioneer has drawn a blank, no-one I have spoken to appears to have heard of its existence, seen it or remember it ever being sold at auction before. It could well be, as with the large bust of Grace, that only a small number were ever made in bronze. The current vendor bought the hand over fifty years ago in 1970 for £36. An intriguing and exciting discovery which appears 'fresh' to the market after all these £8000/12000 many years

Thornton was noted for being the greatest hitter of his day, using the then unorthodox and controversial approach of moving out to hit the ball. Gerald Brobribb wrote in his book 'Hit for Six' that Thornton was considered by all who saw him bat to have hit a cricket ball harder, higher and farther than any other batsman the game has ever seen'. For many years he was a leading figure in the Scarborough Festival. He went to Eton in 1861 and was in the cricket eleven in 1866, 1867 and was captain in his last year 1868. He came second in 'Throwing the Cricket Ball' in 1866 and won the competition in 1867

'Hubbard's Cricket Ground. The Greyhound Loughborough' Early brass [?] disc admission ticket/token with name of the ground impressed to one side with centre image of two bats, stumps and ball and to the other impressed name of the public house and town, the price of entry 2d and the token makers name 'T. The only reference to Hubbard's Ground that the auctioneer can find refers to Loughborough Football Club. The record stand of 340 remained a record until 2005 and Key's score of 281 remained a record score for the University until 2013.

Kingsmill Key went onto play first class cricket for Surrey, whom he captained for several years in the 1890s. Hylton Philipson went onto play for Middlesex and England as a wicket keeper batsman and is well known for his Vanity Fair portrait by Spy published in 1889

Charles Absolon was a leading cricketer in 19th century cricket. Although he never played the game at first class level, he probably played more games of cricket than any other man who lived. Even at the end of his career, between the

ages of 50 and 80, he took 8500 wickets and scored 26,000 runs in good class cricket in the London area. The bat was presented to him at the age of 67. His obituary appeared in both the 1908 and 1909 editions of Wisden

Richard Gorton 'Dick' Barlow, Lancashire & England, 1871-1891. 'My Favourite Bat'. A very historic bat used by Barlow during the 1886 cricket season and abroad on tour with the England team in Australia in 1886-1887. The bat, which a beautiful patina, is a Warsop 'Conqueror' of St. John's Wood, London and is slim with a slightly convex face and a hanging hook has been inserted into the top of the handle for display purposes in the past. 'R.G. Barlow. 285 Stretford Road', Manchester' impressed into the wood on the back of the bat and there is an handwritten label to the top of the face of the bat which read I used this bat through 1886, in England, and in Australia, and among many good scores it made is the following :- For Players v Australians at Nottingham, 113'. Richard Barlow played in 351 first class matches scoring over 11,000 runs at an average of 20.61 with a highest score of 117 v M.C.C. in July 1885. He took 950 wickets at 14.52 with a best of 9-39 v Sussex in June 1886. He played seven times for England against Australia in England: in the match which gave rise to the Ashes at the Oval in 1882; and at Lord's, the Oval, and Old Trafford in 1884 and 1886. Barlow paid three visits to Australia, going

out with Alfred Shaw and Arthur Shrewsbury in 1881/1882, with the Hon. Ivo Bligh in 1882/3, and again with Shaw and Shrewsbury in 1886/1887. He played in every match of all three tours. His batting epitomised the term 'stonewalling'. It was said that for every 100 runs scored by his opening batting partner, Hornby, Barlow would score ten. He also played football as a goalkeeper for Lancashire and ultimately became a Test match umpire.

The bat was used by Barlow in the 22nd/23rd/24th/ 25th and 26th Test matches against Australia and faced the bowling of Spofforth, Giffen, Garrett, Trumble, Turner and Ferris. It was also used to Barlow's 113 for the Players against Australia at Nottingham

The bat is pictured on page 157 of his book 'Forty Seasons of First Class Cricket' 1908 amongst eleven other bats used by Barlow. The bat stands seventh from the left on the image.

A Bartlett 'Reprercussive' cricket bat. An late 19th Century cricket bat made by J.D. Barlett of Waterloo Station, London and dating from around 1888. Little is known of Bartlett's bat making business except that he relied upon the Kennington Oval for some of his business.  'A Warsop Triangular Bat circa1890'.

Warsop, Marylebone' stamped across the splice and below a faded trade mark and 'B. Warsop' impressed to the cap of the bat. Triangular bat enjoyed a very brief period of popularity between 1888 and 1892. Their avant garde design appealed to an age when the bizarre became very trendy. The name still exists today as Warsop Stebbing, cricket bat makers of Chelmsford, Essex

William Gunn. Nottinghamshire & England 1880-1904. A Warsop 'Conqueror' cricket bat used by William Gunn in making 228, the highest individual against the Australians in England, for for the Players of England team who played the Australians at Lord's in 1890. The bat formed part of the Charles Pratt Green of Malvern famous cricket bat collection The face of the bat has the standard Warsop wording impressed to it and back of the bat has been painted gold and inscribed in black painted wording to the width of the top of the blade 'Players of England v Australians. William Gunn was a very tall, graceful

and patient batsman. A classical cover driver, he played in eleven matches for England and featured in twenty six century partnerships with Arthur Shrewsbury. One of the finest batsmen of the early Golden Age, Gunn also played two football internationals for England and in 1885 founded the famous bat making firm of Gunn & Moore.

Electing to bat first, the Players posted an impressive 526 with William Gunn achieving his record score to date of 228, then the highest against Australian bowling in England. Replying, the Australians could only reach 156, John Lyson top scorer with 50, George Lohmann taking 5/61. Forced to follow on, the Players bowled out the Australians again, this time for only 107, Briggs (5/51) and Lohmann (4/53) doing the damage, the Players winning by the substantial margin of an innings and 263 runs. Gunn's innings was probably the most notable century Gunn ever made, 'Restrained, but free from the least mistake, this innings was played with Turner and Ferris in the attack, and nothing as essentially better has ever been done aginst an Australian side'. 'Historic Bats' Pentelow.

448 Thomas Walter Hayward. Surrey & England 1893-1914. 'Champion of all' bat. A H.C. Crawford of Kent cricket bat used by Walter Hayward in the 1899 cricket season, making two Test centuries, four county cricket centuries and a century for the Gentlemen v Players.. The bat formed part of the Charles Pratt Green of Malvern famous cricket bat collection and eventually Lord's museum and was sold by Christie's in the M.C.C. Bicentenary Sale of 13th April 1987 as lot 674. The face of the bat has the wording 'I used this bat during the greater part of season 1899, Yrs truly. Tom Hayward'. The bat unusual in that it has vulcanised India rubber strips inserted crossways between the segments of the cane of the bat handle. Crawford claimed that this gave the bat far better pliancy and driving power than other bats on the market. The blade of the bat is covered in a thin plastic removable covering to protect it and is in good condition. A remainder of the Christie's auction label to verso.

Tom Hayward played for Surrey and England between the 1890s and the outbreak of World War I. He was primarily an opening batsman, noted especially for the quality of his off-drive. Neville Cardus wrote that he 'was amongst the most precisely technical and most prolific batsmen of any time in the annals of cricket'. He was only the second batsman to reach the landmark of 100 first-class centuries, following W.G. Grace. In the 1906 English season he scored 3,518 runs, a record aggregate since surpassed only by Denis Compton and Bill Edrich in 1947. He played thirty five Tests for England and toured Australia on three occasions

Hayward made centuries against Australia of 130 (4th Test) and 137 (5th Test), county centuries 158 v Somerset at The Oval, 273 v Yorkshire, 158 v Somerset at Taunton, 137 v Warwickshire and 134 for the Players v Gentlemen in 1899. Hayward wrote of this bat 'This bat has been the Champion of all' and is listed in 'Historic Bats' Pentelow as bat number 54

Arthur Shrewsbury. Nottinghamshire & England 1875-1902. 'Arthur Shrewsbury's last bat...'. A Shaw & Shrewsbury of Nottingham cricket bat used by Shrewsbury in his final season of cricket in 1902. The face of the bat has the wording 'Arthur Shrewsbury's last bat. Given by him to W.F. Grundy. With it he scored:-' then follows a list of matches and scores finalising in his last match. The scores recorded include 106 v Leicestershire, 101 & 127no v Gloucestershire (same match), 108 v Derbyshire etc. The last entry for late September is the 31 he made in a minor match for Lenton United v F.L. Browne's XI. Some fading to the wording... He scored 1153 runs at an average of 52 with this bat at the age of 42 including a century in each innings, for the first time, v Gloucestershire The bat is double sprung and is covered in an interesting grip which, itself, was in place when the bat was used. An historic cricket bat. Sold with the late vendors research notes giving further information on the bat. £4000/6000

Arthur Shrewsbury was an English cricketer and rugby football administrator. He was widely rated as competing with W. G. Grace for the accolade of best batsman of the 1880s; Grace himself, when asked whom he would most like in his side, replied simply, 'Give me Arthur'. An opening batsman, Shrewsbury played his cricket for Nottinghamshire and played 23 Test matches for England, captaining them in seven games. He was the last professional to be England captain until Len Hutton was chosen in 1952. He was a Wisden Cricketer of the Year in 1890. He also organised the first British Isles rugby tour to Australasia in 1888. An expert on sticky wickets, Shrewsbury topped the first-class batting averages seven times including in 1902, his final season. The following spring, incorrectly believing he had an incurable disease, he shot himself at his sister's home in Gedling, Nottinghamshire.

William Frederick Grundy, cricket author, wrote several booklets on Shrewsbury including 'A Memento of two great Notts. Cricketers, Arthur Shrewsbury and Alfred Shaw' in 1907 and 'Letters of Acknowledgement of The Memento of Arthur Shrewsbury and Alfred Shaw. With a few notes and illustration' 1910

450 John Berry 'Jack' Hobbs, Surrey & England 1905-1934. A Summers Brown 'Force' cricket bat used by Jack Hobbs in making 154no for the Players versus the Gentlemen at at Lord's in 1911. The face of the bat has the standard Summers Brown wording impressed to it and below this is the signature of Hobbs. Beneath this are the following words inscribed in ink 'Record Force Bat. Gents v Players, Lord's 1911. J.B. Hobbs went in first with this bat and played right through the innings scoring 154 not out constituting a record. This bat has scored over 1000 runs'. Jack Hobbs was probably the finest batsman of all time, he played for Surrey between 1905-1934 and played 834 first class matches. He scored over 61,700 at an average of 50.70 with 199 centuries, incredibly ninety eight of them were scored after his fortieth birthday, and a highest score of 316 v Middlesex in 1926. For England he made 61 Test appearances for England scoring over 5,400 runs at an average of 56.74 with a best of 211 v South Africa in 1924.

In the match the players were left to score 423 runs in 290 minutes to win the match in the fourth innings. On a very difficult pitch and facing the bowling of Foster, Douglas and Le Couteur, Hobbs reached 154not out before vhis team were all out for 292. His innings included 24 fours. The Gentlemen won by 130 runs

George Geary. Leicestershire & England 1912-1938. 'What a Bat'. A Gunn & Moore 'Autograph' cricket bat used by Geary during his playing career, the vendor suggests around 1925 in his notes. The bat was presented to William Sherwin. bat maker of Nottingham, son of the former England wicket keeper Mordecai Sherwin. It is inscribed boldly to the length of the blade 'Dear Mr Sherwin. What a bat. No-one could wish for better one. In fact, one could not find a more perfect one. Can you do anything with it. Yours faithfully G. Geary. Geary has also signed the shoulder of the bat. George Geary was one of Leicestershire's most dependable and long serving players. He was a big, strong, fast bowler who thrived on long spells. He was a sound, resolute lower order batsman who scored eight centuries in a long first class career. He played in fourteen Test matches for England

Sutcliffe. Yorkshire & Herbert England 1919-1945. 'Sutcliffe's 1935 bat'. A Stuart Surridge 'Herbert Sutcliffe Autograph' cricket bat used by Sutcliffe during the 1935 cricket season. Herbert Sutcliffe's 1935 season was highly succesful, he scored 1966 runs in total including two double hundreds and six other centuries. He came second in the national averages with an average of almost 50 and topped the Yorkshire batting averages during their Championship winning season. This was Sutcliffe's last series of Test cricket. He played in the first two Tests making 61 in the first but due to injury missed the third. His double centuries were 212 v Leicestershire and 200no v Worcestershire

Sutcliffe played in fifty four Tests for England 1924-1935 and scored over 4550 test runs at an average of 60.73 and regularly opened the batting for England with Jack Hobbs. He scored sixteen test centuries and 151 first class hundreds. His highest Test score was 194 v Australia and his highest first class score was 313 v Essex at Leyton in 1932

453 Clement Arthur Milton. Gloucestershire & England 1948-1974. The years of 1924 and 1925 were probably Sutcliffe's most productive years, both for Yorkshire and for England. Sutcliffe's had an exceptional tour of Australia with M.C.C. in 1924/25. In the five Tests, he scored 734 runs at an average of 81.55 with four centuries and a highest score of 176. In the home season of 1925, he scored 2308 runs for Yorkshire at an average of 53.67 with seven centuries. In 1926, the first four Tests of the 1926 Ashes series were all curtailed by poor weather. The final Test at The Oval was timeless to ensure a finish. It has become one of the most famous matches in cricket history, not because England regained The Ashes but for the manner it which it was achieved as Hobbs and Sutcliffe produced their most famous partnership in treacherous batting conditions. Hobbs and Sutcliffe put up a great defence of their wickets and Hobbs made a hundred and Sutcliffe 161. England won the game comfortably, by 289 runs, and regained The Ashes.

Pelham Warner wrote: 'Hobbs and Sutcliffe won it for us by their incomparable batting. They did not fail us at a time of most desperate crisis. Never has English cricket known a more dauntless pair'. In the County Championship Sutcliffe was second in the batting averages behind Hobbs, scoring 2,528 runs at 66.52 with 8 centuries and a highest score of exactly 200 against Leicestershire.

I have the book in my possession now; it is before me as I write and his handwriting stands out distinctly- 'Presented to Mrs. Grace by William Clarke, Secretary, All England Eleven'. You can imagine how that book was treasured and read by the younger members of the family'. The match Grace refers to was the twenty two of West Gloucestershire Club v All England XI played at Wintle's Field, Bristol on the 6th to 8th August 1855. Grace's uncle Alfred Pocock, Grace's father, Henry Mills and his brothers Henry, Edward Mills and Alfred all played in the match which was won by

the All England Eleven by 167 runs. W.G. Grace was seven years old at the time. The book is presented in a box frame, the book can easily be accessed through the back of the frame, window mounted, framed with printed details beneath. A very rare and historic book presented by an earlier pioneer of cricket to the mother of the soon to be most famous cricketer in history and clearly cherished by W.G.

The book was sold previously in the landmark sale of W.G. Grace's own collection, with many books signed and annotated by him, by Bearne's auctioneers in July 1996 as lot 75.

William Clarke (Nottinghamshire 1826-1855) was renowned as a bowler who, according to E.V. Lucas' 100 Years of Trent Bridge' (1938), played his first match for the Nottinghamshire Eleven in 1816, aged 18. He soon gave up his job as a bricklayer to become the landlord of 'The Bell' which became the headquarters of local cricket. His playing success came later, his first match at Lord's was not until 1836 when he was aged thirty seven, and he made his first appearance for Players in 1846, aged forty eight, the same year that he founded the All England Eleven. He founded Nottinghamshire County Cricket Club and established the Trent Bridge cricket ground (and took over The Old Trent Bridge Inn) in 1838, where the first match was played on 28th May between The Forest Club and South of the Trent.

The Wisden Collection of Robin Marlar (Sussex C.C.C. 1951-1968). Robin Geoffrey Marlar played county cricket for Sussex, was a cricket journalist working mainly for the Times newspaper and was . He played for Cambridge University before playing for Sussex County Cricket Club from 1951 to 1968. He captained both teams. An innovative off-break bowler, he took 970 wickets in 289 matches at an average of 25.22, with a personal best of 9-46 against Lancashire at Hove in 1955. He was described as 'shrewd and skilful' by Wisden. After retiring from professional cricket, Marlar had a successful

journalistic career as a cricket correspondent of The Sunday Times, and wrote the illustrated history The Story of Cricket (1979). He served as chairman of Sussex in 1996 and 1997 and was appointed president of Sussex County Cricket Club for 2005 and President of MCC for 2005-06.

- 1288 'Cricket Match at Darnall, for 200 Sovereigns' 1826. Sheffield and Leicester v Nottingham. Very early and rare original double sided score sheet for the match played at the Darnall New Ground, Sheffield, 24th-26th July 1826. Both sides with printed title, attractive engraving of a match in progress and decorative borders, with the description 'On Monday, July 24, 1826, a Cricket Match will be Played on the New Ground at Darnell, between 6 of Sheffield, with 5 of Leicester given, against 11 of Nottingham for 200 Sovereigns'. One side shows the scores at the close of play on the first day, Nottingham having batted first and being bowled out for 101. Top scorers were G. Jarvis and P. Bramley who both made 20. Rawlins took 5 wickets for 45 runs and Marsden 4 for 51. In reply, Sheffield and Leicester stood at 16/1. The other side of the sheet shows the complete scores at the conclusion of the match. Sheffield and Leicester having reached an impressive 379 all out, including an astonishing innings of 227 by Tom Marsden who batted for over eight hours, to record the third highest first-class score at the time. This was achieved against Nottingham bowlers of the calibre of Thomas Barker and William Clarke and it is recorded that Marsden struck one ball over a 45ft. stone wall, the ball landing some 130 yards from the wicket. Nottingham were then bowled out again cheaply for 75, Marsden, Rawlins and Shelton sharing the wickets, giving Sheffield and Leicester victory by the significant margin of an innings and 203 runs. It is estimated that over 30.000 attended the match over the three days. 7.75"x9". Other notable players who took part include William Lillywhite, Tom Sewell, Thomas Box, William Ward, Roger Kynaston for England, and Fuller Pilch, Walter Mynn, William Dorrinton, Charles Whittaker and William Martingell for Kent. 1290 'Kent v. Sussex. Match of Cricket at Tunbridge Wells' 1848. Early and original small double sided scorecard for the match played at the Higher Common Ground, Tunbridge Wells, 27th & 28th July 1848. The card with printed scores at the close of the first day's play (Kent 82, Sussex 64/4) lists the Kent innings to one side and Sussex to the verso. In a tight match, scheduled for three days but completed in two, Kent batted first and were dismissed for 82. Only three batsmen reached double figures, William Hillyer taking nearly three hours to score 18, Fuller Pilch (18) and Alfred Mynn (14). Replying, Sussex reached 103, William Napper scoring 33. In the second innings Kent made 80, Nicholas Felix ('Wanostrocht') top scorer with 20. Set only 60 to win, Sussex scraped home by just one wicket, with only Charles Hammond (15) and John Wisden (16) reaching double figures. 1291 'Marylebone and Sussex' 1849. Original single sided score sheet for the 'Close of the first two innings, Second Day, Tuesday Aug.

14, 1849' for the match played at C.H. Gausden's (Royal Brunswick) Ground, Hove, 13th- 14th August 1849. The scores depict M.C.C. having been dismissed cheaply for 46 (William Hillyer 15, Henry Royston 11) with John Wisden and James Dean sharing the wickets five apiece. Sussex then made 143, George Picknell top scoring with 59, Thomas Box 39. M.C.C. went on to score 101 in the second innings (Roger Kynaston 35) with Wisden taking eight wickets (thirteen in the match), and Sussex knocked off the required five runs to win comfortably by ten wickets. Reportedly M.C.C. struggled to attract their better 'gentlemen' players to travel for away 'country' matches, and accordingly fielded a weakened side. Originally from the family collection of Charles Hammond who played for Sussex in the match, the score sheet measures 4"x6.5". Published by 'G. 1292 Cambridge University v United England Eleven 1855. Original double sided scorecard for the match played at Lord's on 'Monday (wet) & Tuesday, June 18th & 19th 1855'. The sixteen of Cambridge pulled off an unexpected victory by thirteen runs. Batting first they made only 66, Hammond scoring 16 and Walker 12. In reply United England, featuring notable names such as Nicholson, Dean, Haygarth, Grundy, James Lillywhite, Lockyer, Wisden etc. scored 106 (Tom Lockyer 28). In the second innings Cambridge fared little better reaching 88 (E.T. Drake 30) setting United England only 49 to win. However, not one of the United England batsmen were able to reach double figures and they were skittled out for a remarkable 35. United England's Thomas Nixon took thirteen wickets in the match. Printed by 'Lillywhite's Printing Tent by authority and under the patronage of of the Marylebone and other clubs' with printed fixtures and advertising to lower portion of the front and to the verso. 4.5"x6". 1293 'I Zingari v. The Liverpool Club' 1859. Original early single sided scorecard for the match Gentlemen of Liverpool v I Zingari played at 'Liverpool Ground Wavertree' on 19th & 20th July 1859. Batting first, I Zingari reached 144 in their first innings, Gentlemen of Liverpool replying with 118. In the second innings I Zingari made 198 (A.F. Payne 42) and Liverpool ended 79 for seven and the match was drawn. Three members of the I Zingari team, J. Rowley, B. Grindford and C.E. Hornby (uncle of Albert Hornby) are listed with an asterisk against their name. Apparently, I Zingari arrived for the game three men short and these players took their place. 1294 George Parr's team to North America 1859. First England cricket tour overseas. '11 of England v 22 of the United States'. Two very rare scorecards (thought to be the only surviving original scorecards from the pioneering first overseas tour), printed by Fred. Lillywhite from the third match of the tour. Having played their first two matches in Canada, this, the first in the United States, was played against twenty two of the United States at St. George's Club Ground, Hoboken, New Jersey, 3rd- 5th October 1859. The two scorecards are both titled 'Correct Score from F. Lillywhite's Printing Tent of Lord's & Kennington Oval, London'. One, dated 'Monday, October 3rd, 1859' lists the teams for the start of play, subsequently filled in with scores in pencil that appear to be complete up to the close of the second day's play. The other scorecard, dated 'Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday, October 3rd, 4th, and 5th, 1859', lists the complete printed scores at the close of the match. Making up this very strong team for the match were Parr (Captain), Carpenter, Hayward, Wisden, Caffyn, Lockyer, Diver, Stephenson, Caesar, Grundy and Jackson. The other member of the touring party, John Lillywhite, would have been twelfth man. The Twenty Two of the United States batted first and were bowled out by the strong English team for only 38, John Jackson and George Parr bowling unchanged, Jackson taking ten wickets for only ten runs, Parr taking nine wickets for 26 runs. Parr's XI then replied with 156, Tom Hayward top scoring with 33, Robert Carpenter with 26, aided by the contribution of 25 extras, of which twelve were wides. The Americans' W. Hallis took six wickets for 45 runs. In the second innings, the Americans fared little better being dismissed for 54 with John Wisden and William Caffyn this time bowling throughout, Caffyn ending with figures of sixteen wickets for 24 runs, Wisden four for 26. Remarkably, in the two innings not one of the twenty two American batsmen was able to reach double figures, J.C. Lang being their top scorer with seven runs in their second innings. Parr's XI won the match by an innings and 64 runs.

Previously sold by Christie's as lot 142 in June 2001, the scorecards, each measuring approx. 3.75" x4.75", are laid down side by side to a scrapbook page also comprising newspaper cuttings of a transcript of a court case, and a small original printed card of 'Company F, Eighth Regiment Squad Drills 1859 & 1860'. To the verso an original, crude watercolour sketch of an agricultural scene is laid down. Some age toning to one of the two scorecards, otherwise in very good condition considering the age of these remarkable artefacts from the dawn of international cricket.

Frederick Lillywhite, a member of the the famous Sussex cricketing family, made his name as a sports outfitter, publisher and cricketing entrepreneur. By the time he was 20 he had produced the first edition of The Guide To Cricketers which ran through to his death in 1866, aged only 37, a book which was loosely the forerunner of the more famous Wisden Cricketers' Almanack. In 1859 he accompanied George Parr's professional side on the ground-breaking tour to North America, fulfilling the role of scorer. He also took a mobile printing press and scoring wagon, and subsequently published the definitive account of the trip in 1860, 'The English Cricketers' Trip to Canada and the United States in 1859', followed in 1863 by his 'Scores and Biographies', the first major work on the game in almost a century, as well as scorecards of matches.

The tour was organised by Lillywhite, W.P. Pickering (a former player who had emigrated to Canada in 1852), and R. Waller of the Hoboken Club. The team comprised six members of the All-England Eleven and six from the United All-England Eleven and so represented the cream of English cricket of the period. The tour was a great success, despite being hampered by cold weather and horrendous sea voyages in the North Atlantic gales, both outward and homeward. As Robin Marler wrote, 'Fred Lillywhite's qualities show in his desire to make a proper job of the tour, to demonstrate to the Canadians and Americans the best possible presentation of English cricket, from the proper advertising of the matches right down to the inclusion on the scorecard of the latest wicket to fall. Hence his pre-occupation with the transport of his precious printing press, and his irritation with those who cursed his paraphernalia'.

1295 'Surrey v. Fifteen of Cambridge University' 1862. Original early scorecard for the match played at Kennington Oval, 19th & 20th June 1862. In a remarkable match the fifteen undergraduates beat a strong Surrey team by an innings and 43 runs. Batting first Surrey could make only 85, Julius Caesar top scoring with 30. Cambridge then put on 204 in their only innings, Lang top scorer with 59, Caffyn taking 7 for 75. Surrey's openers made a steady start to their second innings until Caesar was dismissed for 36 and Mortlock for 22. Then the wickets tumbled, four wickets fell in successive balls, five in six balls, and seven for only four runs amidst much reported cheering and laughter. A remarkable

victory against a Surrey team of which eight would be selected to tour Australia six years later. For Cambridge, not only was Lang their top scorer, he also took ten wickets in the match. A number of the Cambridge team went on to play first-class county cricket, namely Clement Booth, Henry Plowden (Hampshire), Arthur Daniel, Marcus Martin (Middlesex), Augustus Bateman (Nottinghamshire), and George Helm (Sussex). Printed by F. Lillywhite, the card measures 4.5"x6", with fixtures listed to the lower portion of the front, further fixtures and advertising to verso. Heavy creasing and apparent water damage, otherwise in good condition. £250/350

1296 'All England Eleven v. United [England] Eleven' 1863. Early original double sided scorecard for the match played at Lord's for the benefit of the Cricketers' Fund, 25th & 26th May 1863. The United Eleven batted first and were dismissed for 109, Jackson taking 7 wickets for 48 runs. Replying, the All England Eleven could only reach 92, Tom Hayward, best with 30. The second innings saw the United Eleven posting 150 (Tom Hearne 44), before bowling out All England for 97 to win by 70 runs. George Griffith took ten wickets in the match for United England. Featuring some of the best players of the day the teams comprised Grundy, Hearne, Mortlock, Carpenter, Caffyn, Newman, Griffth, Iddison, Atkinson, Lockyer, Hodgson (United England), Jackson, Tarrant, Stephenson, Hayward, Daft, Parr, Caesar, Clarke, Tinley, Willsher and Wootton (All England). Printed by F. Lillywhite, the scorecard with fixtures and advertising to front and verso. 4.5"x6". Horizontal folds, some age toning, otherwise in good condition. £200/300

The United England Eleven was formed in 1852 as a breakaway from William Clarke's All England Eleven. Both teams comprised top professional players of the period and played matches all over the country that provided quality cricket prior to the rise of county cricket. On Clarke's death in 1856, the two teams agreed to play regular fixtures pitting some of the best players of the day against each other.

1297 'Surrey v. North of England' 1863. Early original single sided scorecard for the match played at Kennington Oval, 3rd- 5th August 1863. The scorecard with incomplete printed scores lists the North's first innings in which they were dismissed for 211 (Iddison 58, Sewell 8/54), and Surrey having reached 93/3 on the second day's play. Surrey went on to make 198 (Mortlock 54). In the second innings North made 179 (Brampton 36), setting Surrey 193 to win, which they did with three wickets to spare, George Griffth ending 56no. Printed by F. Lillywhite with advertising for Lillywhite's 'Scores and Biographies' to top and bottom margins. 4.5"x6". Horizontal and vertical folds, otherwise in good condition.

The North were reportedly under-represented due to Peel and his fellow professionals refusing to play in the match.

1298 'Eleven of All England versus Twenty-Two of Hull and District' 1863. Early original single sided scorecard for the match played at Hull, 7th- 9th September 1863, showing the scores at the completion of the match on the third day, All England having just won by six wickets. The twenty two of Hull batted first and were bowled out for only 57 with every player dismissed for single figures (with the exception of C.H. Prest who was absent!), Tarrant taking 17 wickets. All England then replied with a score of 90. In the second innings Hull improved slightly scoring 87 with a contribution of 25 by Prest (who had now arrived!). The wickets were shared by Willsher taking eight and Tarrant another six. All England ended their second innings on 56/4 to win by six wickets. Hull's team was augmented by three professionals, Michael MacIntyre (Nottinghamshire 1864, 1 match), Isaac Hodgson (Yorkshire 1852-1866) and Luke Greenwood (Yorkshire 1861-1874), who between them did all the bowling and took all the wickets. George Tarrant's total wicket haul of 23 Hull wickets included seventeen clean bowled. Printed on the ground by Chapman of Hull. 4.5"x6". 1299 'Gentlemen v. Players' 1864 and 1865. Early early original double sided scorecard for Gentlemen v Players matches played at Lord's. Unusually, to one side is the complete printed scorecard for the match played 27th & 28th June 1864, in which the Players scored 187 (Mortlock 71, Arkwright 7/83), and then dismissed the Gentlemen twice for 60 and 59 to win convincingly by an innings and 68 runs, Tarrant (11/49) and Willsher (9/55) bowling unchanged through both innings taking all the wickets. To the verso is the complete printed scorecard for the match played 10th & 11th July 1865. On this occasion the Gentlemen side included W.G. and E.M. Grace in their side and they prevailed with victory by eight wickets, the Players making 132 and 140, Gentlemen 198 and 77/2. E.M. Grace returned match bowling figures of 11 wickets for 78 runs. 1300 Oxford v Cambridge Varsity match 1865. Original early single sided scorecard for the match played at Lord's 26th- 27th June 1865. The card with incomplete printed and handwritten scores in ink (with errors) shows Oxford's first innings which saw them dismissed for 191, R.A.H. Mitchell top scoring with 57, Pelham for Cambridge taking 6/71. Cambridge had reached 79/ 3 and went on to make 119. Having lost their first tour match against Nottingham by an innings, the Australians weren't considered a threat against a very strong M.C.C. team. The match was scheduled for three days but completed in one in just 4.5 hours of play. 1334 'Princes Ground. North v. South' 1878. Prince's Cricket Ground in Chelsea, London was a cricket ground, created by the brothers George and James Prince as part of the Prince's Club, on which 37 first-class matches were played between 1872 and 1878. The ground was built on in 1883. The boundaries of the site are marked by Cadogan Square West, Milner Street, Lennox Gardens Mews, Walton Street and Pont Street. The first match played on the ground was Household Brigade v. Lords and Commons on 3 June 1871, and Middlesex C.C.C. used the ground between 1872 and 1876.

1335 'Oxford v. Cambridge' 1878. Early original scorecard with complete printed scores for the Varsity Match played at Lord's, 1st & 2nd July 1878. Cambridge University batted first, posting 168, with Edward Lyttelton top scorer on 53, Allan Steel 44no. Evans took 5/55 for Oxford University. In reply Oxford could reach only 127 (Alan Greene 35no), Steel taking eight wickets for 62 runs. Cambridge then scored 229 in their second innings, A.P. Lucas (74) and Alfred Lyttelton (64) making a first wicket stand of 117. Alfred Evans took 7/86. Set an unlikely 270 to win, Oxford were skittled out for only 32, their lowest total in a Varsity match, only Edward Hirst (13) reaching double figures. Steel and Morton bowled throughout, taking five wickets each. A.G. Steel's match bowling figures of thirteen wickets for 73 runs was the best recorded in a Varsity match. Kent in their second innings then posted 244 (Penn 67, Ivo Bligh 60, George Hearne 53, James Southerton and Edward Barratt taking five wickets apiece). 1432 Gentlemen of England XI. v. I Zingari' 1904. Early original silk scorecard for the match played at Lord's 6th-8th June 1904. Leonard James Moon (Cambridge University, Middlesex & England 1897-1909) played in four Test matches on the M.C.C. tour to South Africa 1905/06. He died while on active service in 1916.

1433 South Africa tour to England 1904. 'Middlesex v. South Africans'. Rare early original double sided scorecard with incomplete printed and faint handwritten scores in pencil for the tied tour match played at Lord's 20th- 22nd June 1904. Middlesex elected to bat first and reached 272, Bernard Bosanguet scoring 110, J.J. Kotze taking 5/94. The Gentlemen elected to bat first and were bowled out for 167 with Arthur Fielder taking all ten wickets for 90 runs. Bernard Bosanguet was the top scorer with 56, Stanley Jackson made 40. The Players gained a first innings lead of 32, being dismissed for 199, Tom Hayward with 54, David Denton 48, Neville Knox taking 5/73. In the second innings, the Gentlemen reached 321, Reggie Spooner (114) and Harry Foster (67) shared an opening stand of 156. Gilbert Jessop made 73no, Walter Lees took 6/92. Set 290 to win, the Players could not cope with the pace of Knox who took a further seven wickets, giving him match bowling figures of twelve wickets for 183 runs. 1451 South Africa tour to England 1907. 'Essex v. South Africans'. Rare early original double sided scorecard with complete printed scores for the tour match played at Leyton 23rd- 25th May 1907. Electing to bat first, Essex were bowled out cheaply for 89 with only Charlie McGahey (43) and Frederick Fane (15) reaching double figures. After an indifferent start and with the score at 131/6, good batting from Aubrey Faulkner ending unbeaten on 101no, Jimmy Sinclair scoring 51, Ernie Vogler 39, and Stanley Snooke 38no, enabled the South Africans to declare at 355/8 with a substantial first innings lead of 266. Essex were then bowled out for 167 (Sam Meston 46no), Reggie Schwartz taking 5/28, the South Africans winning by an innings and 99 runs. Printed on the ground by Phelp Bros. Ltd. of Leyton. 1452 Colin Blythe, Kent & England 1899-1914. 'Record County Championship bowling figures'. 'Northants. v. Kent' 1907. Rare early original double sided folding scorecard with complete printed score for the match played at Northampton, 30th May- 1st June 1907. A remarkable performance saw Colin Blythe take seventeen wickets in the match. Rain delayed the start of play when Kent elected to bat first. By the close of play they had reached 212/4. Rain washed out play on the second day, and when it resumed on the final day, Kent reached 254 (Wally Hardinge 73, Kenneth Hutchings 52, Billy East taking 5/77 for Northamptonshire. Northamptonshire then came in to bat and were demolished by Blythe who took all ten wickets for 30 runs, his career best bowling figures. last pair George Vials (33no) and Lancelot Driffield (12) got the total to 60. Following on, Northamptonshire fared even worse, being skittled out for only 39, Mark Cox (12) the only batsman in double figures. Blythe took a further seven wickets giving him match analysis of seventeen wickets for 48 runs, all achieved in one day! Kent won by an innings and 155 runs just in time, as the players walked off the field the rain returned! Printed on the ground by Stanton & Sons of Northampton. Colin Blythe was one of the principal left hand spin bowlers of the Edwardian era. He took over 2500 first class wickets with a best of 10-30 for Kent v Northamptonshire in 1907, he followed this by taking 7-18 in the second innings and with match figures of 17 wickets for 48 runs this still stands as the best bowling analysis in the County Championship. He took 100 wickets in nineteen Tests for England with a best of 8-59 v South Africa in 1907. Although Blythe suffered from epilepsy he freely volunteered for the Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry in 1914 and served with distinction on the Western Front. Blythe was killed in action by 'random shellfire' during the battle of Passchendaele. Belgium in November 1917.

1453 Gloucestershire v Northamptonshire 1907. Rare early original folding scorecard with complete printed scores for the match played at the Spa Ground, Gloucester, 10th- 12th June 1907. In a remarkably low scoring rain affected match, only fifty minutes play was possible on the first day, Gloucestershire electing to bat first and ending the day 20/4. The following day they were dismissed for 60, only Gilbert Jessop (22) reaching double figures. George Thompson and Billy East shared the wickets five apiece. Northamptonshire were then astonishingly bowled out for only twelve runs in 11.3 overs, George Dennett taking eight wickets for nine runs including a hat-trick. Five batsmen were out for ducks. Gloucestershire then struggled to 88, Gilbert Jessop

again top scorer with 24, Robin Mackenzie (21) the only other batsman in double figures. East took seven wickets, giving him match figures of twelve for 62. Chasing 137 for victory, by the end of play Northamptonshire were struggling at 40/7, all having fallen to Dennett. However the rain returned and washed out the final day's play, the match being abandoned as a draw. Dennett finished with match figures of fifteen wickets for 21 runs. The South Africans then put on 404 in their second innings with contributions all round from Gordon White (68), Schwartz (51no), Jimmy Sinclair (49), Ernie Vogler (46) and William Shalders (45). Set an unlikely 505 to win, Middlesex were bowled out for 226 (George Beldam 41), the South Africans winning by 278 runs. Printed fixtures for matches at Lord's in 1907 to verso. 5"x8.25". 1455 South Africa tour to England 1907.
'England v. South Africa'. First Test.

The Players were then bowled out for 172 with Alfred Morcom taking 7/76 (his career best) and May a further three wickets to return match bowling figures of eleven wickets for 118 runs. Jessop was only two minutes short of equalling his own record for the fastest century having achieved the feat in 40 minutes for Gloucestershire v Yorkshire at Harrogate in 1897.

1460 Gentlemen of Philadelphia tour to England 1908. 'Derbyshire v. Gent's of Philadelphia'. Rare early original double sided scorecard with incomplete printed scores for the match played at the County Ground, Derby, 17th- 18th August 1908. Scheduled for three days but completed in two, Derbyshire elected to bat first only to be dismissed for 78 with Philadelphia's Bart King taking 7/28, and Derbyshire losing their last five wickets for only three runs. Philadelphia then scored quickly to reach 247, Francis White top scorer with 55, and Frank Greene, batting at number ten, ending 49no in a partnership of 59 runs for the last wicket. Derbyshire batted better in the second innings to reach 185 (Arnold Warren 43), King taking another five wickets to end with match bowling figures of twelve wickets for 116 runs. 1461 Gentlemen of Philadelphia tour to England 1908. 'Grand Cricket Match. Kent v Philadelphians'. Rare early original double sided scorecard for the match played at the St. Lawrence Ground, Canterbury, 27th- 29th August 1908. In their final first-class match of the tour the Philadelphians elected to bat first and scored 188, Christy Morris top scorer with 48, Frank Woolley taking 7/75 for Kent. Hambledon ended 158/6 to win by five wickets, C.B. Fry carrying his bat with 84no. Other notable players who took part in the match include A.E. Knight, E.H. Killick, J.T. Hearne, A.E. Trott, W.E. Astill (England), E.M. Sprot, C.B. Llewellyn, C.P. It appears W.G. Grace was not able to attend the unveiling of the memorial, which was performed by E.M. Sprot, captain of Hampshire C.C.C. The cricket ground was the home venue for first-class matches organised by the Hambledon Club from 1753 to 1781. Immediately next to the ground is the Bat & Ball Inn, known as the 'cradle of cricket', whose landlord for ten years from 1762 to 1772 was Hambledon captain Richard Nyren. Broadhalfpenny Down continued in regular use by Hambledon/ Hampshire teams until 1781. At the end of that season, the Hambledon Club moved to Windmill Down closer to the village. The original ground fell into disuse through most of the nineteenth century and was converted to agriculture. Attempts were made to restore the ground with the result that this 1908 'Hambledon v England XI' fixture was played as a commemorative match and featured numerous famous players including Hampshire cricketer Edward Whalley-Tooker, a descendant of a member of the original Hambledon Club. Following the match in 1908 the ground was reclaimed for farming. Whalley-Tooker set about the task of securing its permanent use for cricket and in

1925 it was restored to host cricket matches.

1463 Australia tour to England 1909. 'England v. Australia'. First Test. Early original commemorative silk scorecard for the 1st Test, played at Edgbaston, 27th-29th May 1909. In a low scoring match, Australia elected to bat first only to be dismissed for 74, Warwick Armstrong the top scorer with 24, Colin Blythe (6/44) and George Hirst (4/28) bowling unchanged. When England replied they lost early wickets, both Jack Hobbs and C.B. Fry being dismissed first ball by Charles Macartney. Contributions from Arthur Jones (28), Johnny Tyldesley (24) and Gilbert Jessop (22) saw them to 121, Armstrong taking 5/27. Australia's second innings saw some improvement, Vernon Ransford and Syd Gregory both scoring 43 in their total of 151. Hirst and Blythe were again the wicket takers, both ending with figures of 5/58. Set 105 to win, Hobbs (62no) and Fry (35no) saw England home to victory by ten wickets. The two then proceeded to put on 119 in the last hour of the second day's play and then continued on the third day, Woolley going on to complete his then highest score of 185, and Fielder completing his highest first-class score and only century, ending 112no, with Kent making 555. Worcestershire never looked like saving the game and were bowled out for 162, Kent winning by an innings and 33 runs. Printed on the ground by J.T.
