CRICKET EPHEMERA

- Australians v Players, Crystal Palace, September 27th 1880. Original handbill, London, Chatham & Dover Railway, announcing 'Cheap Excursions to Great Cricket Match at the Crystal Palace'. Minor age toning to paper, brittle and fragile to edges with some loss. An original item from this early Australian tour £70/100
- 'Queensland Cricket Association. 2 Intercolonial New South Wales v Queensland, Association Ground. 16th to 19th 1889. Gentlemen's ticket'. Very early entry ticket for this cricket match played in Brisbane. Sold with a similar entry ticket for 'New South Wales v Queensland, complimentary, admit bearer to ground and Grand Stand', this ticket plus a further ticket for an excursion to White's Hill (a hill and now reserve in Brisbane), the ticket reads 'Junior Cricket Association. White's Hill Excursion, Friday December 28th'. These last two tickets undated but from a similar period by their print style. Punch hole to the corner of the March 1889 ticket. Some age toning otherwise, all three in good/ very good condition. Rare and early tickets for matches in Brisbane

Queensland beat New South Wales by four wickets in the 1889 match. The Queensland team consisted of fifteen players against the eleven of N.S.W. The New South Wales team contained several Test players including Sydney Gregory, Frank Iredale, Sydney Callaway, Samuel Jones etc. Arthur Coningham, who played one Test for Australia, took eleven wickets in the match for Oueensland

The Australian Cricket Team 1909'. Folding fixture/itinerary card for the Australian tour of England 1909. Decorative covers, with title, with cameo pen pictures of the players and facsimile signatures of the tourists to inside pages and tour fixtures to back cover. R.F. Steel.

- 'The Block'. Melbourne. Minor wear and soiling to outer covers, tape to spine otherwise in good condition. Rare £100/150
- 'A Supper Dance to welcome home the N.S.W. Members of the 1930 Australian Cricket Team at David Jones', Saturday 22nd November 1930. Tickets 7/6. Proceeds in aid of Sydney Industrial Blind Association. Three similar tickets for the supper numbered 651 to 653. The New South Wales members of the team were Don Bradman, Alan Fairfax, Archie Jackson, Alan Kippax, Stan McCabe and Bertie Oldfield whom attended the Supper. Odd very minor faults otherwise in very good original condition £50/80

In November 1930, over 800 people attended a dance at David Jones in Sydney to welcome home the New South Wales members of the Australian cricket team. The event honoured players like Don Bradman, Allan Kippax, McCabe, and Oldfield. The West Indies team members were also guests of honour. A memento in the form of a silver clock was presented to each cricketer by Mr. R. A. Oxlade, acting chairman of the Australian Board of Cricket Control.

Australia tour to England 1930. 'The Australians 1930'. Original linen handkerchief with printed title and images in pale brown of the Australian tourists from original photographs by A. Wilkes & Son of West Bromwich. Woodfull (Captain), Fairfax, Richardson and Oldfield are depicted full length to the centre, surrounded by cameos of Wall, a'Beckett, Bradman, Walker, McCabe. Grimmett. Hurwood. Ponsford, Hornibrook and Jackson. The handkerchief measures 16" square. Very good condition.

For some unknown reason there are fourteen of the fifteen tourists pictured on the handkerchief, Kippax is missing from the full touring party

Australia v England 'Bodyline' 1932/33. A collection of nine original copies of The Sydney Mail magazine, four complete, others lacking wrappers or with pages detached. Each issue has at least one article of coverage from the tour and Ashes Test series, the majority written by Dr. Eric P. Barbour with interesting and extensive reports and comment on the Bodyline controversy. 28th September 1932 pp 8-9 two page article on Bradman. 19th October p8 'Greatest Batsmen of all Time', pp 26-27 centre spread of the tourists, p30 article on upcoming cricketers (incomplete). 2nd November, four detached pages including the front page with photographs of the England and Western Australia teams, pp 32-33 illustrated report on the tour match at Perth. 7th December, pp 26-30 five page report with photographs of the 1st Test at Sydney. 18th January 1933, front cover cricket image, pp 8-9 two page article 'Test-Match Interludes' by S. Elliott Napier, pp26-30 including centre spread photographs of the 3rd Test at Adelaide titled 'A Hard Battle that may mark a Crisis in Cricket', and reports by Barbour, p46 full page photograph of the England team. 25th January, pp 28-31, conclusion of the 3rd Test. 15th February, front page cricket illustration, pp 24-28 report on the 4th Test at Brisbane. 8th March, pp 28-29, report on England's Ashes series victory, Barbour claiming that the majority of Harold Larwood's deliveries (and that of the Australian. Harry Alexander) were no-balls based on slow-motion film evidence suggesting his back foot dragged over the bowling crease before the release of the ball under the old back foot law. 15th March, pp 28-29 with a page comprising a series of still photographs from slow-motion film providing evidence to back up Barbour's opinion regarding Larwood's action. Wear and tear to some wrappers, otherwise in good clean condition. An excellent record of the 'timeless' series with immediate reaction to the controversies from an Australian point of view. £100/150

The Sydney Mail was a large format magazine published weekly from 1860 until it ceased in 1938. Eric Barbour co-wrote with Alan Kippax the book 'Anti-Bodyline' published in 1933 in which portions of the Sydney Mail articles were reproduced.

'A Sixer!'. Cricket Records and Fixtures: The English Team's Visit to Australia 1932-33' 'Bodyline'. Rare pre tour booklet, published by 'The Shell Company Limited (1932). 12pp. The front cover has a very colourful image of a large cricket ball having been hit by the batsman with title to centre. The top edge of the booklet is curved to shape the edge of the ball. Contains mainly records of England-Australian Test matches with forthcoming fixtures and printed photographs of the first English team in Australia and the First Australian team in England. Colourful advertising for Shell to rear cover. A previous owner has crossed out the matches up to December 16th and written in results of the first two Tests. Some rusting to staples. A rare and fragile survivor published prior to the infamous series in £250/350 Australia

Whitehall Evening-Post'. Original early four page tabloid size newspaper for 'Thursday July 19, to Saturday, July 21, 1733'. Sold by J. Roberts near the Oxford Arms in Warwick Lane, London. Starting on page two column 2 and following is a short report of a cricket match, 'Last Wednesday [11th July 1733] a great Cricket-Match was played on Molesey-Hurst in Surrey, between Eleven Surrey Men and Eleven of Middlesex, which was very hard matched: The Surrey Men beat [won] only by three Notches'. The Prince of Wales attended and awarded each player a Guinea 'for their great Dexterity'. No details of the match are known. Duty stamp to lower right corner of first page. Expert repair to fold, otherwise in very good condition for its age. A rare item. £70/100

The ground at Molesey (or Moulsey) Hurst in Surrey is considered one of the oldest venues used for organised cricket, the earliest recorded match having been played there in 1723. The ground is the subject of one of cricket's most famous paintings, 'Cricket at Moulsey Hurst' by Richard Wilson, 1780, which hangs at Lord's.

'The Old Whig: or the Consistent Protestant'. Original early four page tabloid size newspaper for 24th June 1737. Sold by J. Roberts near the Oxford Arms in Warwick Lane, London. Starting on page two column 3 and following is a report of a cricket match, 'Yesterday the great Cricket-Match between his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, for Surry [sic] and London; and the Lord John Sackville, Son to his Grace the Duke of Dorset, for Kent; was played on Kennington Common'. The report records Kent scoring '99 Notches' and Surrey 31, in the second innings Kent 'got upwards of 70, and three knocked up their Wickets', then Surrey 'went in, but wanted 40 of the Number got by the Kent side'. The match was witnessed by 'the greatest Concourse of People ever known on such an Occasion'. A further report on page three column 2 reports on a woman being seized by 'Officers of the Excise... for retailing Geneva [gin]' but being rescued by some cricketers who 'oblig'd the Excisemen to take to their heels'. Duty stamp to lower right corner of first page. Minor wear to fold, otherwise in very good condition. A rare item. £70/100

'The Daily Gazetteer: or, London Advertiser'. Original early two page newspaper for 25th September 1746. Printed by J. Griffith at the Crown, Fleet Street, London. Page two column 2 features a thirteen line cricket report and announcement. 'The great Match at Cricket, of Five on a Side, that was played in the Artillery Ground on Friday the 12th Instant, and won by the London Players, occasion'd a Challenge for Five of London to play against any Five in any one Parish in England; which Challenge is accepted of by the Parish of Bromley in Kent: And this Day Long Robin, John Bryan, James Bryan, and Two others of Bromley, play against Stephen Dingate, Little Bennett, Tall Bennett, and Two others of London, for Fifty Pounds in the same Place...'. No record of either match can be found. Uneven trimming to all edges, otherwise in very good condition. A rare item. £70/100

'The Edinburgh Evening Courant'. Original early four page newspaper for 11th July 1772. Printed for R. Fleming, Edinburgh. Page two column 2 features a twelve line report of a dispute at a cricket match. 'The Prince of Wales was lately playing at cricket in Kew Gardens, with Lord Herbert, two sons of the Bishop of Chester, and others. A dispute, in the course of their play, happened to rise between two of the party. and it went so far that the Lie was exchanged between them; upon which the Prince immediately put an end to the match at cricket, and by a stratagem, drew the disputants into a small apartment in the palace, where, as a punishment, he locked them in by themselves, for the space of an hour, declaring that they were fit company for one another'. Duty stamp to lower right corner of first page. Minor wear to fold, otherwise in very good condition. A rare item. £70/100

'The Morning Post and Daily Advertiser'. Original early four page broadsheet newspaper for 10th August 1786. Printed by P. Stuart, Strand London. Page two column 4 features a cricket report, 'Thursday last the match of cricket between the Earl of Winchelsea and Sir Horace Mann' at Molesey Hurst, Surrey, and finished on Saturday, the latter beating the former [by] twenty three runs'. The full scorecard is printed below. The match appears to be that recorded on cricketarchive.com as 'A to C v Rest of the Alphabet' played at Moulsey Hurst, 2nd- 5th August 1786, with the Earl of Winchelsea playing for the Rest of the Alphabet team and William Fennex (listed as 'Phenix') making his first-class debut. Duty stamp to lower right corner of first page. Minor wear to fold, otherwise in very good condition. A rare item. £70/100

13 'The London Chronicle'. Original early eight page newspaper/ magazine for 7th- 9th June 1787. Sold by T. Wilkie, St. Paul's Churchyard, London. A report on page 547 columns 1 & 2 states 'Tuesday [5th June 1787] a grand match commenced at the new Cricket ground near Paddington [Lord's Old Ground], between eleven gentlemen of the White Conduit Club, and eleven gentlemen picked from the county of Middlesex', with the players listed below. The report records Middlesex scoring '131 notches in the first innings, and the Club 171 with three wickets to go down' at the close of the first day's play. On the second day 'at the conclusion of the second innings the Gentlemen of Middlesex were 37 runs above the first innings of the White Conduit Club. Sir Peter Burrell and Mr. Aston Smith, on the side of the Club, then went in and got 39 runs, which was one more than necessary... The ground was much crowded'. Duty stamp to lower left corner of second page. Very good condition. A rare item. £70/100

14 'The London Chronicle' 1789. Early and original tabloid size eight page newspaper for 25th to 28th July 1789. Volume LXVI, No. 5119, published by T. Wilkie of St Paul's Churchyard. With one and a half columns recording 'Laws of the Game' of cricket together with rules on betting on the game, an early record of the laws. 'Cricket. This game, at present fashionable, and at all times, so creditable and manly will, it is feared, receive a check from the variable state of the weather'. The newspaper has some wear to spine and the front page is almost detached. A rare item £300/500

The first attempt to produce a common set of laws was in 1744, these laws appeared on handkerchiefs, but not in print until 1755, in a pamphlet of which not many were printed. A major revision was undertaken in 1774 and in 1787 the newly formed M.C.C. revised the laws again. It is this version of the laws which appears in print in a newspaper for the first time giving a much wider circulation and seems to suggest that cricket was becoming popular with the middle classes as well as the noblemen

15 'The Times'. Original early four page broadsheet newspaper for 12th August 1789. Printed by R. Nutkins, Blackfriars, London. An amusing 33 line report on page 3 column 2 records 'On Wednesday last a match of cricket was played at Hackney, between the gentlemen of the Club at that place, and the young Gentlemen of a school in the neighbourhood. The former, consisting of two grandfathers, four fathers, and such as had passed their prime, offered a challenge to an equal number of the latter, which was readily accepted. The juvenile appearance of the scholars, contrasted with the aged consequence of their opponents, afforded much mirth to the spectators'. The report continues with a description of the post-match entertainment and speeches. No record of the match or who took part in it can be found. Minor age toning expert repair to fold, otherwise in good/ very good condition. A rare £70/100

'The Kentish Gazette'. Original early four page broadsheet newspaper for 2nd- 6th July 1790. Printed by Simmons and Kirkby of Canterbury. Page one column 2 features a 'Cricketing' announcement with an attractive woodcut image of a match, often seen in Kent newspapers of the period. 'On Thursday the 8th Instant, will be played a Match of Cricket on Aldington Frith [near Ashford, Kent], for One Guinea a Man, between the Gentlemen of the Aldington Club, and the Gentlemen of Rolvenden. A Good Ordinary on the Ground by Charles Crothel'. No record of the match can be found. Foxing, horizontal and vertical folds with some splitting to folds, wear to edges and some loss to lower corner of pages 3 & 4, otherwise in good condition. A rare item. £70/100

'The Morning Post'. Original early four page broadsheet newspaper for 19th June 1793. Printed by J. Norris, Strand, London. Page three column 3 reports 'On Monday last and Yesterday was played a Grand Match, in Lord's Ground, Mary-le-bone', between Gentlemen of the Mary-le-bone Club, and the County of Essex, for 500 Guineas'. Full scores are listed below with M.C.C. scoring 133 & 78, Essex 118 & 95/7, Essex winning by three wickets. The M.C.C. team featured notable players including the Earl of Winchilsea, Thomas Lord

(founder of Lord's cricket ground). William Fennex, Henry Fitzroy, George Louch, Henry Tufton, Robert Brudenell etc. A further article on page 3 column 1 reports 'a match of cricket was played on Bury Common, in this county, by females, the married women of that parish, against the maidens, which was won by the former... by 80 [runs]. So famous are the Bury women at a cricket match, that they offer to play with any eleven, in any village in the county, for any sum'. Duty stamp to lower right corner of page one. Very good condition. A rare item.

'The London Chronicle'. Original early eight page newspaper/ magazine for 9th- 11th August 1796. Sold by T. Wilke, Paternoster Row, London. Page 139 column 1 features an intriguing and amusing 23 line report on a cricket match. 'Tuesday a curious cricket match was played at Montpelier Gardens [Walworth, London], between 11 of the Greenwich pensioners, wanting an arm each, against the same number of their fellow sufferers with each a wooden leg. Not fewer than 5000 people were assembled on the occasion, who were highly entertained with the exertions of the old veterans of the ocean... each party striving to quit the field victorious. The evening coming on, the contest could not be decided: but it was so much in favour of the timber toes, as never to be recovered by the dint of arms'. Following the match 'A scuffle ensued, and several persons lost their watches and money. One or two of the crew were secured, and sent to Newington watch-house'. A similar match is recorded as having been played on the same ground one week later, 16th & 17th August 1796. Partial duty stamp to lower left corner of page one. Some wear to spine, otherwise in very good condition. A £70/100 rare item.

19th Century cricket. A collection of 107 original newspapers covering the period 1802 to 1894, a time when cricket's popularity was growing at home and overseas. The collection starts with twenty seven copies of the English Chronicle from 13th May to 30th September 1802,

the first reporting a match between Eleven Gentlemen of Woolwich and Eleven Gentlemen of Bromley for 500 guineas. Most of the reports from 1802 relate to clubs in London and the suburbs, but also some from Brighton where the Prince of Wales patronised the cricket. Lord Frederick Beauclerk features in several reports, playing for teams including the Eleven of England. The Prince of Wales appears again in 1804, where a report in the London Chronicle of September 11th has the Prince bowling, 'His Royal Highness partook the pleasures of the game for some considerable time. An accident at length, in bowling, unfortunately compelled him to discontinue play'. The Morning Post of 31st July 1807 has the scorecard of a match at Cheltenham between 'gentlemen visitors', and the Norfolk Chronicle of 15th July 1809 reports on some village matches. Pierce Egan's Life in London from 1825 reports on several days play in the match between All England and 22 of Sheffield at Darnall, and others from that year cover matches including at Canterbury where players were 'maimed and otherwise disfigured' by a hailstorm, at High Wycombe where the Eton players ripped up the wickets when one was given out, at Teignbridge 'It is highly pleasing to find the noble game of cricket making such progress in the West of England'. 1831 brings a lengthy report in the Norfolk Chronicle on what the season will bring for the Norwich Club. 'The Norwich Ground now possesses in Fuller and William Pilch two first-rate men; and it is with pleasure we see the acquisition of such a cricketer as Fuller Pilch to our ground'. The Weekly Dispatch of 1831 ventures further afield with a report on Glasgow v Edinburgh, and Leeds v Wetherby, where the match was abandoned when 'One of the Leeds side refused to abide by the decision of the umpire on his own side'. The Maidstone Journal of 1832 has reports on various matches, and features an attractive woodcut image of a match, often seen in Kent newspapers. Chambers Edinburgh Journal of 1832 has a lengthy piece with instructions on fielding positions, and Bells Weekly Messenger of 1833 reports on a

law case about betting on a match between Warwick and Birmingham. 1844 sees the first overseas newspaper in this collection, the Public Ledger of Philadelphia, which reports on the match between the Union Club of Philadelphia and the Union Star Club of Brooklyn. Bell's Life in 1854 shows that cricket has developed in to a money-making enterprise with advertisements for cricketing goods, and the Wolverhampton club wishing to employ a professional. The New York Times of September 1859 reports the match between the England Eleven and 22 of Canada, on the first overseas tour of an England side. Two other newspapers report on this tour, Harper's Weekly (New York) featuring an article on 'The Cricket Mania'. The Illustrated Sporting and Dramatic News of 1882 reports on the Australian tourists, with the issue for October 7th having a large illustration of scenes from the banquet given to the tourists. There are several copies of The Times from 1888 reporting on the Australian tourists, and the collection ends with a copy of Harper's Weekly from September 1894, which has a short, inaccurate, history of cricket in America. Each newspaper is individually preserved in a protective sleeve, all housed in a brown cloth-covered solander box with title label 'Newspapers' to spine. A collection of twenty three original typed, copy and handwritten letters between Harry Altham and Don Bradman covering the period August 1958 to June 1963, and three other documents including minutes of meetings running up to, and after, the Imperial Cricket Conference in July 1960, when Altham was President of the M.C.C. and Bradman was an Australian delegate. Seven original letters from Bradman are signed 'Don' or 'Don Bradman' with copy letters from Altham. The collection was published by Christopher Saunders Books in 2020, edited by Robin Broadhurst, Altham's grandson. The Conference dealt, amongst other things, with the subject of bowlers' actions and

'throwing', and documents resulting from the conference highlight the fact that the English and Australian delegates were not always in agreement with each other. Bradman had not originally been expected to attend, but the Australian board eventually decided to send both him and Dowling. A fascinating collection of correspondence highlighting the mutual respect between the two, the diplomatic skills of Altham, and the extent to which Bradman and Australia were frustrated by what they had to deal with. Further to this is a typed listing of items taken as 'treats' to the soldiers including food, playing cards, footballs, magazines, cricket materials, cigarettes etc. A rare signatures from a very early Australian cricketer who made his one appearance for the national side in the inaugural Test in England in 1880. William Moule (1858-1939) had a short cricket career, and though he played a few times for Victoria, most of his first-class appearances were on the 1880 tour of England with the Australian team. He played in the one Test match of the tour, a hastily arranged match at The Oval which was the first Test in England. Moule's success to that point had been modest and he played only because Fred Spofforth was injured. In the Test he batted at No 11 and was the sixth bowler tried.

With three wickets for 23 runs he was the most successful bowler in England's first innings and his 34 in Australia's second innings helped in a last-wicket partnership of 88 with his captain that avoided an innings defeat. Hugh Trumble. (Victoria & Australia 1887-1904) was Secretary of the Melbourne Club in 1925

Ted a'Beckett had a short Test career playing in only four Tests for Australia 1928-1931, including one on the 1930 tour to England. He retired from first-class cricket aged 25 to concentrate on his career as a barrister.

Single page typed letter from Hartigan to Hugh Trumble (Victoria & Australia 1887-1904) on the official letterhead of 'The Queensland Primary Producers Co-operative Agency Ltd.'. Hartigan is asking Trumble for a copy of the Melbourne Club Annual Report, and enquires whether temporary membership can be arranged at Melbourne and Sydney for friends to attend Test matches. Hartigan made two Test appearances for Australia in 1907/08 and was a member of the touring party to England in 1909 but was not selected for the Test matches.

John Lillywhite. Sussex, Middlesex & England 1850-1869. Early one

page handwritten letter in ink, on John Lillywhite's Cricket Warehouse, Euston Square letter head, dated October 10th 1860. Lillywhites writes 'Sir, I have a chimney that smokes very much. I should like one of your 'Patent Wind Guards' if you can warrant it to stop the smoking', signed 'Yours very truly' John Lillywhite. John Lillywhite was part of a famous cricketing family, with his father, William Lillywhite, brother, Fred Lillywhite, and cousin, James Lillywhite all playing the sport. In 1863, members of the family established the sports outfitters Lillywhites. At the end of the 1859 English cricket season, Lillywhite was one of the 12 players who took part in cricket's first overseas tour when an English team led by George Parr visited North America.

51 Hon. Ivo Francis Walter Bligh, 8th Earl of Darnley. Cambridge University, Kent & England 1877-1883. Single page handwritten letter on Cobham Hall headed paper dated 25th April 1911. Bligh is replying to F.S. Ashley-Cooper for a request for cricket records with a polite brush-off 'I will write you a line about the Best English Eleven... but I am doubtful if I shall have any such opportunity'. Nicely signed 'Darnley'. Horizontal fold. Very good condition.£200/300

Bligh led the England team which went to Australia in 1882/83 and recaptured the 'Ashes'. He was presented with the famous urn by a group of Melbourne ladies after England's victory in the series, and his wife presented the urn to the M.C.C. shortly after Bligh's death in 1927. Bligh became the 8th Earl of Darnley in 1900.

52 Neville Cardus and Irving Rosenwater, 1955. Two handwritten letters. The first, from Rosenwater to Cardus, dated 16th May 1955 and written on two sides of small ruled note paper, refers to Cardus' appreciation of Gilbert Jessop. Rosenwater asks for the source relating to Jessop's 'famous innings of 104 at the Oval in 1902 [in which] Jessop "scored

50 in 55 minutes": while in no way wishing to doubt the accuracy of this statement, I would be most grateful if you could give me the source of where that information came'. In his reply dated 19th May 1955 written from the National Liberal Club, London, Cardus states he too had 'much trouble getting the right time of Jessop's miraculous innings' and quotes his source as the 'M.C.C. Cricket Scores and Biographies (1925)'. Both letters signed by the respective correspondent, with the original envelope from Cardus. Very good condition. £50/70

Charles Burgess Fry. Oxford Sussex, Hampshire, University, Europeans & England 1892-1922. Original undated handwritten manuscript by Fry comprising nineteen numbered pages plus covering letter and postscript, both or which are signed by Fry. In the manuscript, Fry discusses batting styles using a referencing system of 'A' as the method of performing batsmanship and 'E' as the effect it causes. He acknowledges L.C.H. Palairet, stating 'To call LCHP a supreme stylist means "being what I am, knowing what I know, the way LCHP plays produces the effect it does, giving me a maximum satisfaction; and I have seen no other batsman who gives me this maximum"', continuing by stating that Palairet was 'essentially an off-driver- what other strokes had he? In the standard cricket of his time 9 balls out of 10 were on or just outside the off stump- the off drive was the most necessary and valuable of scoring strokes'. He continues by rating other off-drivers, 'the 3 best off drivers I've seen are LCHP, Trumper and Kippax. W. Gunn a close rival, with Hammond. Hammond and Trumper were much better at "forcing" back strokes than the other 3- who had not the stroke'. and makes further references to W.G. Grace, Ranjitsinhji and Bradman. The covering letter is addressed to 'Dear Alfred', possibly Alfred Cochrane (Derbyshire & Oxford University 1884-1888), author of cricket verse and compiler of the book, 'Told in the Pavilion'. A previous owner has inscribed in red ink to the covering letter 'Miscellaneous cricket m.s. Tie up & mark "Fry & Trumper"'. Some

rust marks to the covering letter and postscript, light creasing, otherwise in good condition. £70/100

William Gilbert Grace. Gloucestershire & England 1865-1908. Three page handwritten letter, on black bordered 'In Memoriam' style paper from Grace, dated 6th December [c.1880]. Grace is writing in his capacity as a doctor to an insurance company regarding the outstanding claim for a life policy being made by a Mr. W.D. Moore, whose wife, a patient of Grace, has recently passed away. It appears that payments of premiums have been missed, and Grace states. 'I think as it seems to be partly the agent's fault for not giving him proper notice, that it will be very hard lines if he doesn't get his claim, and besides he is very badly off. I believe I must apologise for troubling you with this letter but I think it is our duty to help a member [of] our profession if we have the chance'. Nicely signed 'W.G. Grace'. Horizontal folds with some splitting to folds, some wear, otherwise in good condition. Unusual to see such a lengthy non-cricketing letter from Grace. £200/300

William Gunn. Nottinghamshire & England 1880-1904. Single page handwritten letter from Gunn, dated 23rd June 1916. Written on official letterhead for 'The County Cricket. Football, Lawn Tennis and British Sports Warehouse, Carrington St., Nottingham', Gunn states, 'It is with very much regret my daughter and self learn the sad news of the irreparable loss of your dear husband', offering his 'sympathy and regret in your sad bereavement'. Very nicely signed, 'Yours faithfully, William Gunn'. The letter is laid down to a modern card beside a facsimile image of Gunn. Minor foxing, age toning and light folds to the letter, otherwise in good condition.

Gunn was employed in Richard Daft's shop in Nottingham, and was a founder of the well known cricket and sporting business, Gunn & Moore, which opened for business in 1885.

56 Lord Martin Bladen Hawke, Yorkshire & England 1881-1911. A two page handwritten letter in ink from Lord Hawke, who was Captain of Yorkshire for many years, to Shirley Slocombe, the (male) artist who was commissioned in 1903 to paint Hawke's portrait. Dated 6th September 1917, and written on official Yorkshire C.C.C. headed paper, Hawke is replying to Slocombe who has sent his price for painting another portrait, presumably that of Hawke's wife, the Yorkshire committee wishing to present him with a wedding gift. Hawke states 'i have nothing to do with the final decision - all I can do is tell one of the Committee your price'. (The portrait was eventually painted by Slocombe.) Hawkes continues by relating his recent experience in London, 'I was in Jermyn St. Tues night & [a] big bomb dropped in Charles St.- too near to be pleasant'. Nicely signed 'Hawke'. 57 Walter William Read. Surrey & England 1873-1897. Single page handwritten letter in black ink on the official business letterhead of Read's firm of auctioneers, surveyors and land agents. Dated 3rd October 1899, Read is writing to a Mr. Edward Deering confirming that '[George?] Griffith did hit Benwell for 4 consecutive 6's in the Surrey v Kent [match] at the Oval but cannot say for certain what year it was'. 58 Edward Mills Grace. Gloucestershire & England 1870-1896. Handwritten two page letter on Park House, Thornbury letterhead from Grace to a Mr. Palmer, dated 30th June 1896. Grace is writing regarding the arrangements for a Thornbury match, 'I have put down our match as fixed for Tuesday July 21st at eleven o'clock. We always have luncheon Salmon- Cold chicken, meats etc., & ordinary, drinks included at 2/6 per head. This at the Ship adjoining our ground at Alveston. The landlady would like to know about how many to expect to lunch'. Signed 'I am yours faithfully, Edward Mills Grace'. Heathfield Harman 'H.H.' Stephenson. Surrey & England 1853-1871. A selection of ephemera relating to Stephenson, collected by Irving Rosenwater and contained in a large yellow envelope neatly annotated by Rosenwater to the front. Contents include an original two page letter to 'Dear Daft' dated 13th July 1896, the year Stephenson died. Writing from Uppingham, Stephenson refers to arrangements Uppingham's upcoming 'match with the Americans', being Haverford College who were touring England schools and universities that summer. Nicely signed in ink 'H.H. Stephenson'. The letter has been heavily trimmed, not affecting the very rare signature. Also enclosed are Rosenwater's typed and handwritten articles and notes on Stephenson. Subjects include Stephenson's 'immensely significant' captaincy of the first England team to tour Australia in 1861/62, Rosenwater describing him as a 'talented all-round player, a professional to command the respect of his fellow- professionals, a cricketer with experience of overseas touring, and an educated man'. Also notes relating to the appointment of Stephenson to stand as umpire with Bob Thoms in the Oval Test of 1880 against Australia, the first Test match to be played in England. Rosenwater records this appointment 'as something of a surprise and a curiosity, for I believe it is correct to say that Stephenson did not umpire in any other first-class match that year', but that 'The Surrey authorities... had known him not only as a player and a man of integrity, but indeed as an umpire in the matches between the County and Uppingham School, and... [he] had virtually a decade of experience umpiring inter- school matches played by Uppingham'. Other items include a facsimile copy of a Melbourne Cricket Club document of 25th March 1862, offering a 'purse of One hundred sovereigns' to the England touring party to Australia, captained by Stephenson, notes on Stephenson's connections with Uppingham School where he coached cricket. A very

rare signature of a pioneering figure instrumental in England's inaugural overseas cricket tours and first Test match. Very good condition.

Stephenson was the first cricketer to be awarded a hat for taking three wickets in consecutive balls, hence the coining of the term 'hat-trick', which he achieved for the All-England XI against Hallam in 1858. He was a member of George Parr's touring party to North America in 1859, the first overseas tour by an England team.

Edward Wentworth 'Ted' Dillon. Kent Oxford University 1900-1923. One page type written letter from Dillon to William Findlay, Secretary of M.C.C. The letter, dated 8th November 1923, on 'H.W. Dillon & Sons, Steamship and Insurance Brokers' headed paper. A brief message to Findlay 'My Dear Billie, Ever so many thanks for your letter of yesterday and I much appreciate tour promise to do what you can to help'. Signed 'Yours sincerely' Ted Dillon. Ted Dillon captained Kent 1909-1913

John Masefield. Poet Laureate 1930-1967. 'Eighty Five To Win'. Two page handwritten letter in ink from Masefield, written on both sides of his 'Burcote Brook, Abingdon' headed note paper. Dated 'May the 25th 1956', Masefield is writing to a Mrs Martin at The Times newspaper, thanking her for sending galley proofs for checking prior to the publication of his poem on the Oval Test of 1882 when England's last five wickets fell to the Australians for eleven runs, watched by 20,000 spectators, 'The crowd sat stunned an instant at the blow,/ Then cheered (and none had heard men cheering so),/ Cheered the great cricket that had won the game'. Masefield comments on some errors in spacing on a few consecutive lines on the second page of the proof, 'Otherwise it could go to press'. The accompanying proofs comprise two long narrow pages, each measuring 28"x4.5", and one shorter 10.5"x4.5", the first page bearing his annotated comment,

'Please remedy the gap on the second page of this, then Press', with his handwritten corrections to the second page. Both the letter and the proof nicely signed 'John Masefield'. All contained in a buff envelope from Irving Rosenwater's collection, with titles to the front in different coloured inks in Rosenwater's distinctive hand. Very good condition. £100/150

Masefield's poem 'Eighty Five To Win' appeared in The Times on 29th August 1956 and described England's second innings against Australia at The Oval in 1882 in which, set only 85 to win, they fell short largely due to 7 for 44 from 'The Demon' Spofforth. The match led to a spoof obituary for English cricket and the birth of 'The Ashes'.

Percival King. Surrey 1871 (one match). Single page manuscript handwritten in ink by Percival, titled 'Cricket Records'. Written on the reverse of King's official business letterhead, King describes various cricketing records. 'For the long period of 13 years the score of 404 not out by E.F.S. Tylecote made at Clifton College in May 1868 held the place of premium score for an individual cricketer'. He goes on to describe this record being surpassed by W.N. Roe (415) in 1881 for Emmanuel College), J.S. Carrick (419no in 1885 for West of Scotland), and A.E. Stoddart (485 in 1886 for Hampstead). 'The record of the Orleans Club who... scored 930 in August 1882 is still unbroken'. He continues by describing records of bowlers taking ten wickets in principal matches, naming John Wisden, V.E. Walker, E.M. Grace, James Lillywhite, Alfred Shaw, Edward Barratt, W.G. Grace and others. Very nicely and boldly signed 'Percival King'. Percival King (1835-1910) was a cricket coach and ran a sports good wholesale business based in Edinburgh. He was a leading influence in the development of cricket in Scotland and was editor of The Scottish Cricketers' Annual and Guide 1870-1888.

63 Alfred Lyttelton. Cambridge University, Middlesex & England 1876-1887. Two page handwritten letter on House of Commons note paper from Lyttelton to 'My dear Billy', dated 6th February 1913. Very nicely signed 'A. Lyttelton'. Very good condition. £80/120

Lyttelton played in four Test matches for England including the first to be played in England in 1880. He also played football for England.

Vijaysingh Madhavji Merchant. Hindus, Bombay & India 1929-1952. Single page typed letter from Merchant to P.N. Sundaresan, Editor of 'Sports Cine'. Dated 21st October 1975 on his personal letterhead, Merchant states he is unable to contribute an article as he is contracted to broadcasting a programme titled 'Cricket with Vijay Merchant' sponsored by the Thackersey Group of Mills. He is also unable to place an advertisement 'as last year our Company made a very big loss, and for the first time in 60 years we did not pay a dividend'. Nicely signed in black ink by Merchant. In a career spanning twenty three years, Vijay Merchant scored 13,470 first-class runs and his average of 71.64 is second only to Don Bradman.

- Syed Mushtag Ali. India 1933/34-1951/52. Single page typed letter from Mushtaq Ali in Indore, dated 23rd March 1986 to 'Mr. Khadim Hussain [Kim Baloch]'. Ali writes to 'convey my heartiest thanks to you and express the feeling of my joy and pleasure to receive your letter'. He continues by rating some of the players he knew including S. Wazir Ali, C.K. Nayudu, Nissar, Imran, Jack Hobbs, Tate, Grimmett and Gavaskar. He closes with a request for '4 pair of thick white cricket socks for me... we don't get nice cricket socks in this country. Nicely signed in ink 'Mushtaq Ali'. Light folds. - 66 Lieutenant Colonel Chandrasekhar Vaman Gadkari (Retd). Regiment of

Artillery (Maharashtra, Services and India, six Test matches, 1953-1955). Typewritten letter, dated 20th June 1986, on personal printed letterhead to a cricket collector regarding a request for autographs, talking of cricket past and present and mentioning obtaining old players addresses. Signed 'Sincerely Yours' by Gadkari. Light folds, good condition £30/50

Ivan Julian 'Jack' Siedle. Natal & South Africa 1922-1937. Three page handwritten letter in ink from Siedle. written on Anglo-African House, Durban letterhead, dated 10th November 1932. The letter, with original envelope, is addressed to Colonel Harry Sparks of Sydenham, Durban. Siedle writes expressing his concern 'that your nephew Dudley is reported to have signed for Berea. I wonder if you could throw any light on the matter'. Siedle is concerned 'that the only thing which would keep him from becoming a member of the D.H.S.O.B. [Durban High School Old Boys] side would be the fact that he would be living away from Durban... I would very much like to keep an eye on Dudley as I think he may go far & always have looked on him as the next S.A. [South Africa] fast bowler'. Very nicely signed 'Jack Siedle'. A typed copy reply letter dated 12th November 1932, written on behalf of Colonel Sparks by an unknown correspondent, explains personal reasons were behind the invitation to Dudley to play for the Berea Club, stating 'I certainly had no idea that my action would lead to misunderstanding of hard-feelings'. The identity of 'Dudley' is uncertain, but may refer to Dudley Alexander Sparks who played seventeen first-class matches for Natal and Orange Free State 1932-1947. Jack Siedle played eighteen Test matches for South Africa 1927-1937.

'Rare Cricket Letters and Photographs. Ex-Neville Weston 1938'. Half morocco leather green scrapbook compiled by Weston on the collector Charles Pratt Green. This album appears to have been one of Weston's scrapbooks with the binding put on by a later owner. Weston has handwritten a very short

biography of Pratt Green to the front end paper and dated this 1949. This is followed by a list of photographs which have been given by Pratt Green, which will be found in the album. This is headed 'Photographs etc presented to me July 23rd 1938. Sadly some of the photographs listed are no longer in the album, but others have been added. The album contains twelve letters from Pratt Green, with copy replies from Weston. Also included is a copy of Pratt Greens privately printed booklet on Malvern 'Memory's Harkback 1852-1940', with notes of the Malvern of seventy years ago including pieces on his bat collection, Ashley Cooper and Shelton. There are several handwritten postcards and letters from Ashley Cooper and from A.W. Shelton, a letter from J.N. Pentelow, three letters and a postcards from H.K. Foster (Worcestershire 1899-1925), two from F.S. Jackson (Yorkshire & England) and one from Monty Noble of Australia. The letter from Noble dated 1905, refers to a request for a cricket bat from Green, There is a signed photograph of Tiger Smith, and some photographs of Pratt Green in old age. There are ten laid down cabinet cards, with three signed of William Gunn (Foster), Ashley Cooper and Henry Luff (Hawkins), (Proprietor of Wisden), the unsigned cards are of Richard Daft, P.F. Warner (Fry's), J.H. Broad, Charles Absolon (Latter), Thomas Padwick, The Australians of 1888 (London Stereoscopic & Photographic Company Ltd of London and an image of MacLaren's 228 bat (Ayling) There is also an early small photograph of Trent Bridge with both cricket and a football match being played simultaneously with different crowds watching each. 'Genealogy of Lillywhite Family compiled by F.S. Ashley-Cooper'. A small collection of letters, notes and facsimiles relating to the history of the Lillywhite family, all contained within an envelope annotated to the front by Irving Rosenwater. Included is a single page handwritten letter in ink from James Lillywhite Jun. dated 6th December 1916. Writing from Westerton, Chichester in Sussex, he refers to various family members, 'Capt. Robt. John Lillywhite was killed in Yorkshire on the 26th Nov, he did not play cricket. Aged 23. His father's name was John who died the 12th May 1915. My father John Lillywhite died Nov. 18th 1880 & my grandfather 10th Aug. 1846. I never heard of a Charles Lillywhite in connection with this family, and if a Charles played in 1837 it must have been a fictitious name or altogether another family... I am keeping wonderfully well for one nearly 75'. Very nicely signed 'Faithfully yours, James Lillywhite'. Four further pages of notes in various hands, including that of Irving Rosenwater, relate to the family including references to the 'half-brothers' Frederick William and John not being by the same father, John and Charles being step-brothers to 'F.W.'. Also included

is a neatly drawn family tree dating back four generations to Thomas Lillywhite who is described having been 'tried for smuggling at the Chichester Court on 16th January 1749, and was acquitted'. Good/very good condition. £200/300

James Lillywhite Jun. (1842-1929) played 256 first-class matches for Sussex 1862-1885 and two Test matches when he led the England team on the 1876/77 tour to Australia. He was the cousin of James senior whose son, Fred was editor of the Lillywhite's Cricketers Annual. In 1879 James Jnr. took over the family business, which then became John & James Lillywhite & Co. In 1882 it became James Lillywhite & Co and in 1885 it was absorbed by Lillywhite, Frowd & Co. He died at Westerton, Chichester in 1929

'My Cricket Collection and Cricket Literature by G. Neville Weston. 1929. Letters'. A scrapbook compiled by Weston relating to his book which had just been printed and sent out to collectors. There were eighteen copies produced, all signed and numbered. The scrapbook contains an extraordinary collection of letters to Weston, from collectors thanking him and telling him of other books he might like to have. There are letters from collectors, bookshops and dealers offering him items. Many of the letters are lengthy and contain fascinating details on collectors of the day. His most frequent correspondent is Charles Pratt Green with seventeen letters and Ashley Cooper nine letters/postcards, There are also multiple letters from C.J. Britton, Henry Ling, J.N. Pentelow, A.W. Shelton, Norman Gale and J.B. Payne. Others are represented by one or two letters such as Harry Altham, Home Gordon, Hunter, H.M. Cohen, Rockley Wilson, J. Holmes, M.W. Luckin, R.M. Bell, Andrew Lang, S. Santall, A. O'Neill, Alfred Gaston, W.R. Wright and others. There are letters from the M.C.C., The British Library and booksellers such as Hatchards, Cotterell, Foyles, Phillips and Hudsons. Other letters from cricketers V.E. Walker and F.R. Foster as well as an autograph page of a Surrey team of the 1930's,

signatures include Fender, Hobbs, Hitch, Strudwick, Abel etc. One or two items from the index have a pencilled cross beside them and are no longer in the book. A wonderful resource for those interested in the intertwining of collectors and dealers in the days when most dealing were conducted by post. Title in gilt to front board. Good condition

'Bibliography of the work of the late F.S. Ashley-Cooper. Correspondence, Lists etc.'. A large 'Newspaper album Cuttings' scrapbook compiled by G. Neville Weston, with handwritten title label to front cover, comprising research material for, and the publication of, 'A Bibliography of the Works of F.S. Ashley-Cooper', which Weston published privately in 1933 as a limited edition of 100 copies (Padwick 42). Loosely inserted to the front is a typed numbered list of those who received copies, a draft typescript of Weston's introduction with handwritten corrections, describing Ashley-Cooper as 'probably the greatest authority on Cricket History', and receipts, newspaper cutting reviews etc. The opening pages of the album comprise Weston's handwritten index of the writers of letters in the scrapbook, followed by an extensive section comprising letters from correspondents relating to the genesis of the bibliography, many of which allude to the inspiration for its production. These include a copy of a letter from T.R. Hunter, the newly appointed Secretary of the Cricketana Society, forwarded by the Birmingham booksellers and publishers, Cotterell & Co., with Hunter's list of Ashley-Cooper's published writings enclosed including 'one or two inaccuracies', and Weston's typed copy replies to Hunter in which Weston refers to his own (then incomplete) bibliography numbering some 75 publications. Further letters include a number from John Wisden & Co. stating that Ashley-Cooper wrote '103 books and pamphlets on cricket... [based on] information obtained by Mr. C. Steward Caine, who was a personal friend', and a selection of correspondence with A.W. Shelton who appears to have encouraged Weston to complete the compilation

of the complete bibliography, also signed letters from Ashley-Cooper prior to his death in 1932. There then follows a section of correspondence relating to the printing of the title and subsequent distribution, with the remainder containing an extensive collection of letters from recipients of the book, a good number handwritten and signed, all expressing their admiration and thanks. Correspondents include Charles Pratt Green, Henry Ling, Neville Cardus. Julien Cahn. R.P. Keigwin, Raymond Robertson-Glasgow, Pelham Warner, H.S. Altham, J.M. Barrie, E.V. Lucas, C.E.M. Wilson, Tom Higson, 'Shrimp' Leveson-Gower, Lord Hawke, F.S. Jackson, J.B. Payne, R.H. Lyttelton, A.W. Pullin ('Old Ebor'), J.C. Snaith, C.J. Britton, Hubert Preston, Ashlev-Cooper's widow etc. Several letters are addressed to Shelton who had taken several copies to present to people. At the rear of the album is a selection of letters from Irving Rosenwater dated 1954 in which Rosenwater is enquiring about obtaining a copy, Weston offering one for sale for three guineas. Rosenwater also writes about Ashley-Cooper's birth date and name having found a birth certificate for 'Frederick Samuel Cooper', born on 22nd March 1877 at Southwark, suggesting he had added 'Ashley' to his name in his teenage years. A fascinating record of the compilation of this important reference work of Ashley-Cooper's writings on cricket. Very good condition. £500/800

Frederick Samuel Ashley-Cooper (1877-1932) was a significant contributor to cricket history and statistics, publishing 103 books and pamphlets on the subject, and wrote obituaries for Wisden for over thirty years. George Neville Weston is renowned as being probably the greatest historian on the history of W.G. Grace, in particular his attention to the detail of minor matches in which Grace played throughout his career. Weston and T.R. Hunter were both members of the Cricketana Society when it was founded in 1929 by C.J. Britton, Weston holding the post of Secretary and Treasurer.

Don Bradman. A fascinating correspondence collection of between Bradman and Christopher Martin-Jenkins, then editor of 'The Cricketer' magazine relating to short-pitch bowling. The first letter is a response to an editorial in the October 1984 issue of 'The Cricketer', written by Christopher Martin-Jenkins, in which the subject of intimidatory short pitched bowling was raised, including the possible introduction of measures such as increasing the length of the pitch, painting a line on the pitch, restricting the bowler's run up to ten yards, or a change in the law such that a batsman is not out caught if the ball had struck the glove or bat handle. Bradman responds to these ideas in a single page typed letter dated 3rd October 1984 to Martin-Jenkins, having read the article 'with interest... and astonishment'. Bradman acknowledges need to remove 'intimidation as a tactic' but lays the blame with umpires 'unwilling to exercise a moral judgement'. His view on the abolition of batsmen being out off the glove 'is an illogical and stupid way of trying to solve [the issue]', and that the idea of lengthening the pitch 'would be equally absurd, penalising batsmen of all types'. Bradman concludes by questioning whether the LBW law is adequate for spinners. 'Don't support remedies which don't make sense... I believe you are on the wrong track'. Signed 'Don'. In Martin-Jenkins' typed copy reply, dated 11th October 1984, he quotes statistical evidence supporting the concept of lengthening the pitch in proportion to the growing height of bowlers over time and increased speed through 'modern nutrition and physical training methods'. Bradman replies on the 30th October with a lengthy three page typed letter reiterating his views in strong terms on 'the foolishness of the "not out caught" idea' and that lengthening the pitch would be unfair to slow and medium paced bowlers. He uses colourful language such as 'utter fallacy', 'arrant rubbish', and is 'totally unmoved by your argument', refuting the view that modern bowlers are 'fitter, stronger and faster' and provides lengthy anecdotal evidence. He closes with

a request that his views are not to be published but is happy for this letter to be shown to Jim Swanton 'and would be interested to know his re-action'. Signed 'Don'. In Martin-Jenkins' reply of 8th November he acknowledges that the change to catches off the glove 'would not be a good thing', but does not accept all of Bradman's arguments about fast bowlers, and further supports the introduction of a line across the pitch. On 28th November Bradman suggests the introduction into Test matches of a wide off a short ball, as was already the case in limited over cricket, but suggests that the 'stumbling block would be the West Indies... because they would regard "anything" as a move to blunt their fire power. Signed 'Don'. Later correspondence in 1992 relates to Bradman's agreement to the 'return to the back foot for judging a no-ball', and readdresses the subject of lengthening the distance between the two creases, and the supposed increase of the average height of players over time. He provides interesting evidence from a book written by W.G. Grace in 1891 in which Grace quoted the height and weight of players of his era, and lists numerous players over six foot in height, including Grace himself who was 6' at the age of sixteen. Signed 'Don Bradman'. Finally, Martin-Jenkins responds on 23rd June 1992 by thanking Bradman for his trouble, but that this 'has not altered my view that it would be desirable to at least experiment with some matches played by first-class cricketers with the stumps set a foot further back at either end and with the old back foot [no-ball] law in operation'. A fascinating insight into Bradman's opinions on the modern game. Good condition. £300/500

Hugh Trumble played his first Test match for Australia against England at Lord's in July 1890. He played in thirty two Test matches for Australia and was an off break bowler and middle order batsman. brother of John William Trumble (Victoria & Australia 1883-1890). His best bowling analysis was 9-39 for Australia v South of England in 1902. He became Secretary of Melbourne C.C. in 1912, a position he held for twenty years. Syd Gregory played fifty eight Tests for Australia 1890-1912, then a world record, and captained Australia on the 1912 tour to England for the Triangular Test tournament. He achieved a top score of 201, being the first double hundred to be scored in a Test in Australia.

A wicketkeeper-batsman, Khurshid 'Charlie' Ahmed toured England with Pakistan Eaglets in 1952. He was selected as the reserve wicketkeeper for Pakistan's first Test tour. to India in 1952-53, but played in only four of the 12 first-class matches and none of the Tests. On the tour he scored a century in his first first-class match, against Central Zone. He opened the batting in the second innings, and after the first three wickets had fallen for 18 he added 189 for the fourth wicket with his captain, Abdul Kardar, and finished with 101 in 137 minutes. He played one first-class match soon after the tour, then disappeared from the first-class game while still in his teens to work as an accountant and play club cricket as a professional in England arriving in 1954. The Pakistan national cricket team toured the Republic of India in the 1952–53 season, playing five Tests. The First Test was the first-ever Test for Pakistan after its inception and the second match resulted in Pakistan's first Test victory. India

won the series 2–1 with two Tests being drawn.

Hobbs and Sutcliffe were invited to join a private tour to India and Ceylon organised by the Maharajkumar of Vizianagram ('Vizzy') in 1930/31. He was only the second batsman to reach the landmark of 100 first-class centuries, following W.G. Grace. Effectively an 'A' tour with only three players over the age of 20, four unofficial Tests were played, Pakistan winning 2-1 with one match drawn. The touring party was almost recalled following an incident in the 3rd 'Test'. Following four lbw dismissals in the first innings, the irate England players 'kidnapped' Pakistan umpire Idrees Baig and poured cold water over him. Only diplomatic interventions between the M.C.C. and the Pakistan cricket authorities saved the tour.

The Coghlan brothers' contributions to the match are recorded as Augustus being run out for thirty, and Charlie scoring nineteen in one over and hitting the winning runs, with Lord Abercorn, the Viceroy, watching on. The author states in the preface, 'The characters are real; the names are not fictitious' but no record of

The hero of the match is the captain of the Britannula team, Jack Neverbend, whose team are set 1500 to win in the second innings, Jack scoring a fighting 1275 to win the match. Barrymore's interest in cricket is referred to in passing on page 8, with more on his passion for the game on page 85, 'during the last three years of his life, he became an indefatigable cricketer... he suffered no impediments that the elements could throw in the way... he has frequently played for four hours together in the country, in a heavy and continual shower of rain!... On the day he perished, his footman James... had been ordered by his Lordship to procure eighteen of the best bowlers in the neighbourhood of Rye, to make a party in the following week: but alas! Death bowled down his wicket before his desires could be fulfilled'. He died in a shooting accident aged 23. Not recorded in Padwick. Very good condition. £150/250

Richard Barry, 7th Earl of Barrymore (1769-1793) was an infamous gambler, sportsman, theatre enthusiast and womaniser. He played two matches for Brighton in 1791 and 1792, now rated as first-class, scoring 1 run (not out) in three innings.

Allen describes his poem as 'a very clever exercise... about half the words in most of the 66 verses are the same as in the original Chevy-Chace ballad'. The front endpapers have pencil notes by previous owners, including one stating that a copy sold at Sotheby's in 1927 for £23. Three bookplates to inside front

Faithfully transcribed from the Original Inscriptions, which are still perfect, and appear to be drawn up in a stile [sic] devoid of fulsome panegyric, or unmerited detraction'. Sir Herbert Croft. Printed for G. Kearsly at No. 46 in Fleet-Street, London 1780. A collection of satirical epitaphs of notable people in three sections, the first part being 'The Eighth Edition, with considerable Additions' comprising pp (iv),1-82, the second part being the 'Third Edition, Corrected', pp (iv),83-132, and a 'General Index to Both Parts' pp 133-141. All bound together as one volume in modern grey boards with title label to spine. Names throughout have been anonymised as was common practice at the time, presumably for legal protection. In this copy a few names have been filled in by a contemporary hand. Cricket interest appears on page 65 with the epitaph of 'B.... Earl of T....., referring to Charles Bennet, 4th Earl of Tankerville, who 'fell foul to the prowess of Mr. L..pey ['Lumpy'], at K..., on the 3rd of Sept. 178-; His death being occasioned by too precipitate an interruption of his antagonist's ball in a long Stroke'. 'Lumpy' was Edward 'Lumpy' Stevens, a gardener employed by Tankerville mainly for his bowling. It is supposed that it was the accuracy of Lumpy's bowling that led to the addition of the third, middle, stump in the 1770s. Tankerville was one of a group of noblemen who met to decide on the laws of cricket in 1774, and he was an early benefactor of Surrey cricket. Not listed in Padwick.

This collection followed Croft's other similar work 'The Abbey of Kilhampton' (see previous lot). John Sackville, 3rd Duke of Dorset, was regularly satirised in the late eighteenth century. An avid cricket player and patron, he was Ambassador to France when the French Revolution broke out.

The lengthy poem is written anonymously and satirises two cricketing aristocrats, 'his Grace the Duke of D..s.t [Dorset], and the Earl of T..k..v.lle [Tankerville]. The Duke of Dorset and Earl of Tankerville were well-known cricket enthusiasts, Tankerville employing cricketers such as Edward 'Lumpy' Stevens on his estate. The author hopes the nobles will grow up and stop playing cricket, 'I deferr'd the publication, from the fond hope, that as you grew older you might grow wiser... disappointed in my wishes, and despairing of a reformation (for I am informed you have got a fresh Cargo of Bats and Balls, and that Lumpy, Small, Horseflesh, with several other equally respectable personages, are order'd to prepare their shins for another campaign) I take the liberty of presenting to your Lordships this testimonial of my regard'. The writer continues by emphasising how wrong it is for members of the ruling class to participate in a lower class sport, which 'beardless Boys with Beggars share'. Lumpy, Small and Horseflesh are also attacked, 'With Lumpy, Horseflesh, and a score beside, Scum of St. Giles's, and their Lordships Pride'. The 'Scum of St. Giles' infers that some of the cricketers were from the area known as one of the worst slums in London, described later by Henry Mayhew, the 19th century reformer, as the synonym of filth and squalor. A leaf has been laid down to the page opposite the title page with F.S. Ashley-Cooper's handwritten notes on the book, mainly reproducing a piece from the Monthly Review of 1779. A note above in pencil states, 'This was taken from a duplicate copy sold to E.D.R. Eagar, 1966'. Padwick 6888. Very rare, only three copies are recorded in institutions in the UK, at the M.C.C., British

Library, and the Bodleian. This copy was previously sold for £13,750 (including premium) as Lot 52 in the Christie's sale of M.C.C. duplicates in 2010. Very good condition.

Richard Polwhele, the Cornish historian, was a friend of John Wolcot when they both live in Cornwall, and in Polwhele's 'Biographical Sketches' of 1831, he names Wolcott as the author of this book. Wolcott moved to London in 1780 and wrote satires under the name of Peter Pindar. This was written anonymously while he was still living in Cornwall.

Only Britcher and Epps preceded Bentley in listing important matches. Without these three pioneers, records of many matches would have been lost when the Lord's pavilion burnt down in 1825. Bentley was intimately concerned with cricket as a player and umpire, and lived close to Lord's.

Originally intended to consist of three volumes, Parts II and III covering player biographies and tables of statistics were never published.

The cricket ground was the home venue for first-class matches organised by the Hambledon Club from 1753 to 1781. Immediately next to the ground is the Bat & Ball Inn, known as the 'cradle of cricket', whose landlord for ten years from 1762 to 1772 was Hambledon captain Richard Nyren. Broadhalfpenny Down continued in regular use by Hambledon/ Hampshire teams until 1781. At the end of that season, the Hambledon Club moved to Windmill Down closer to the village. The original ground fell into disuse through most of the nineteenth century and was converted to agriculture. Attempts were made to restore the ground with the result that this 1908 'Hambledon v England XI' fixture was played as a commemorative match and featured numerous famous players including Hampshire cricketer Whalley-Tooker, a descendant of a member of the original Hambledon Club. An unveiling of a granite memorial, erected to mark the site of the original cricket ground, was performed by E.M. Sprot, captain of Hampshire C.C.C. Following the match in 1908 the ground was reclaimed for farming. Whalley-Tooker set about the task of securing its permanent use for cricket and in 1925 it was restored to host cricket matches. In the 1908 match the England XII elected to bat first and were bowled out for 124, Francis Ford top scorer with 33, George Dennett 28. Jack Newman took 8/54 for Hambledon who then scored 277 thanks to a career best 114no by William Jephson and 59 from Teddy Wynyard. In the second innings the England XII fared better scoring 309 with contributions from George Leach (80), Arthur Roberts (69), Gilbert Jessop (48) and George Wilder (43). Newman took a further five wickets ending with match bowling figures of twelve wickets for 120 runs. Set 157 to win, Hambledon ended 158/6 to win by

five wickets, C.B. Fry carrying his bat with 84no. Other notable players who took part in the match include A.E. Knight, E.H. Killick, J.T. Hearne, A.E. Trott, W.E. Astill (England), E.M. Sprot, C.B. Llewellyn, C.P. Mead (Hambeldon) etc.
